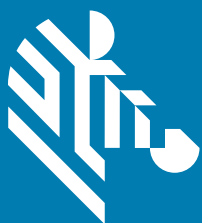
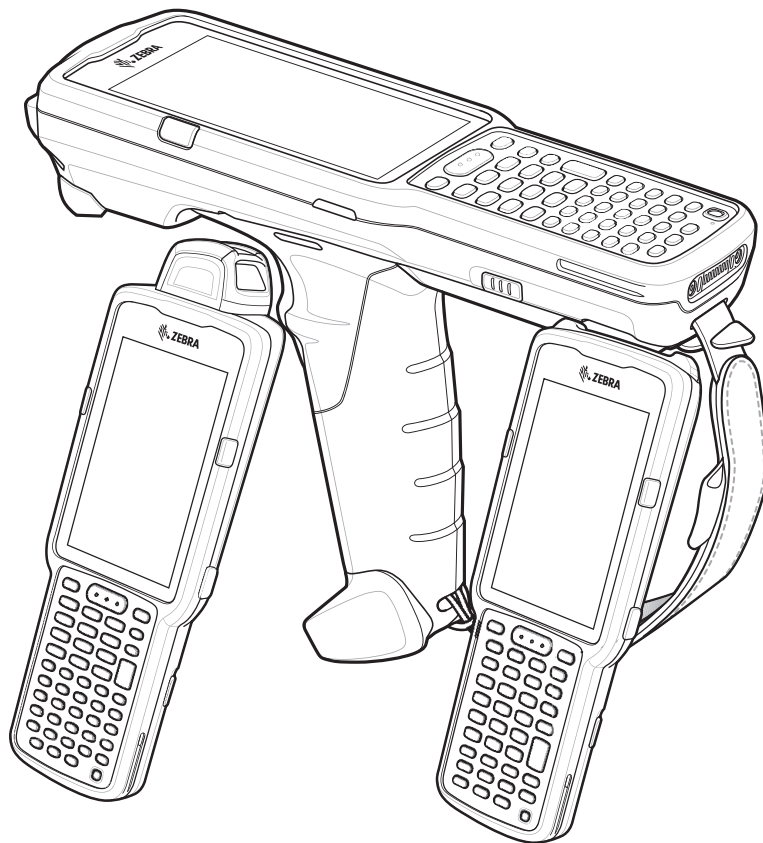

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About This Guide

Introduction

This guide provides information about using the MC33XX mobile computer and accessories.



NOTE: Screens and windows pictured in this guide are samples and can differ from actual screens.

Configurations

MC33XX used in this guide refers to all configurations, except where noted. MC33XX-G refers to the Trigger configuration. MC33XX-R refers to the Rotate configuration. MC33XX-S refers to the Straight configuration. MC33XX-S45 refers to the 45 degree angle Straight configuration.

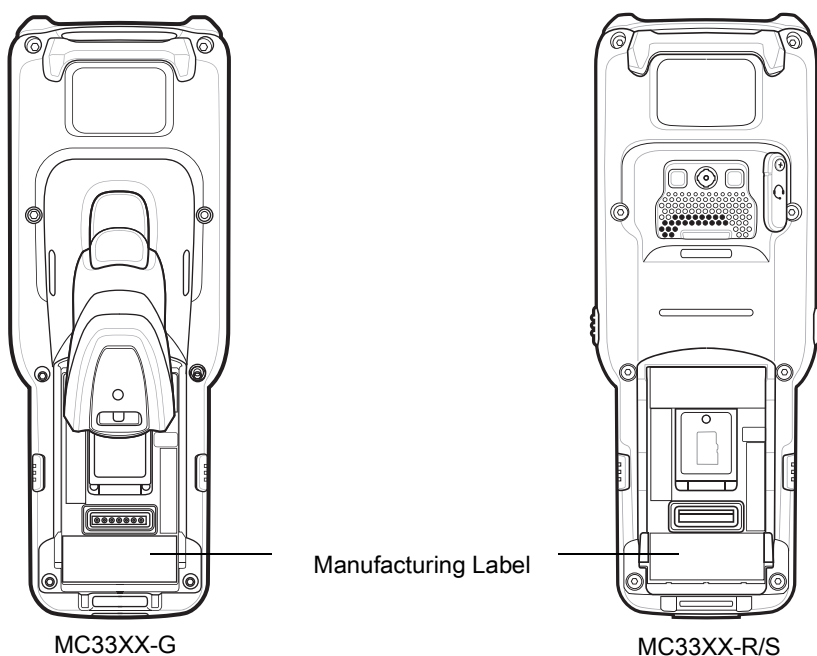

Figure 2 MC33XX-G Front View

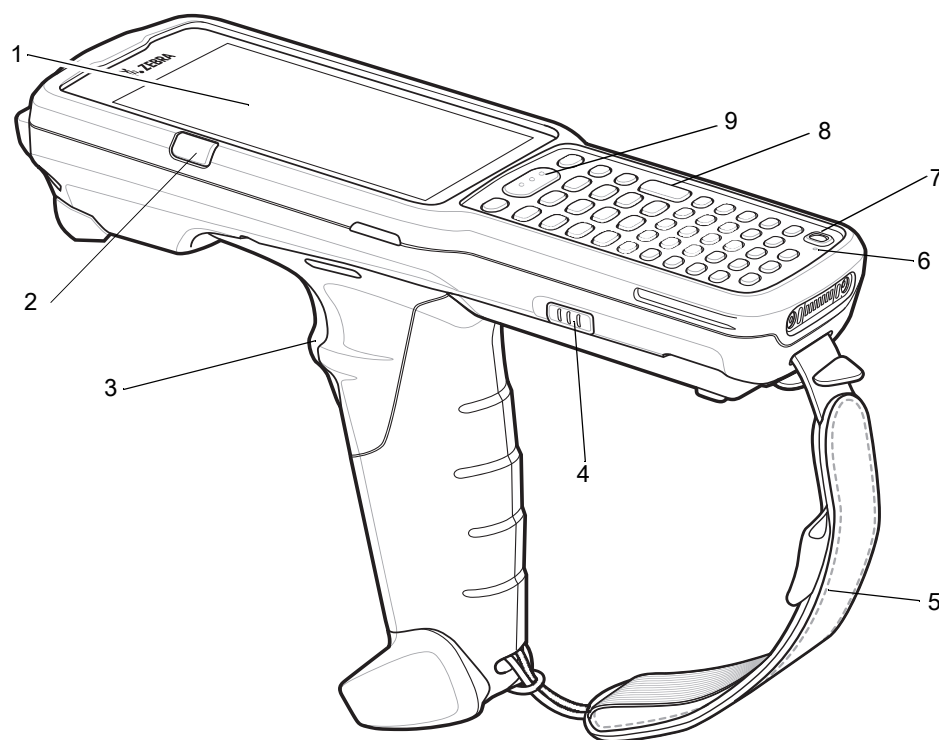

Figure 3 MC33XX-G Back View

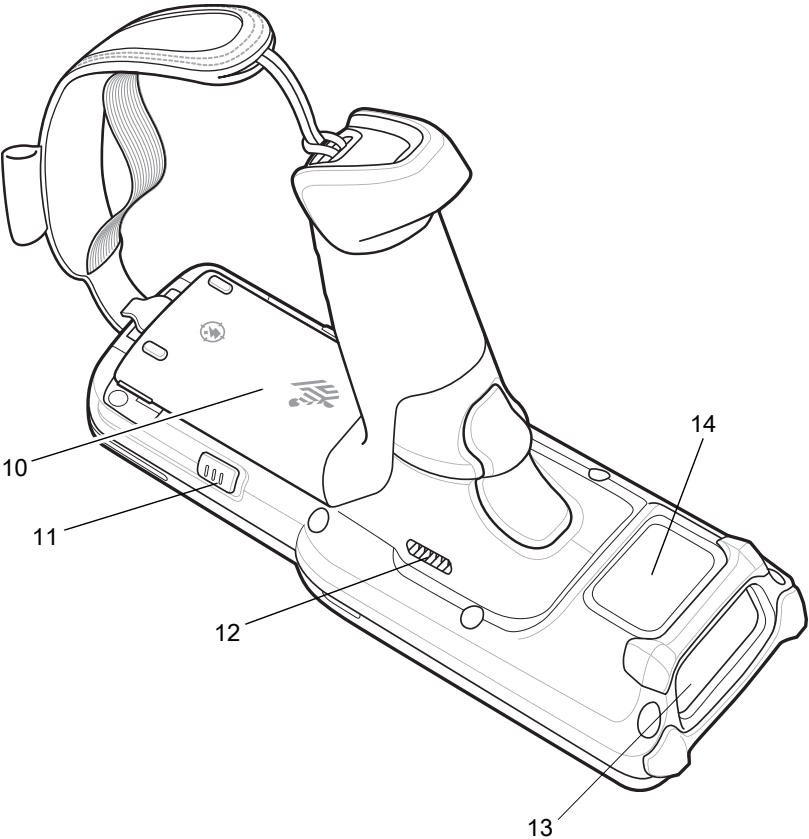

Figure 4 MC33XX-R Front View

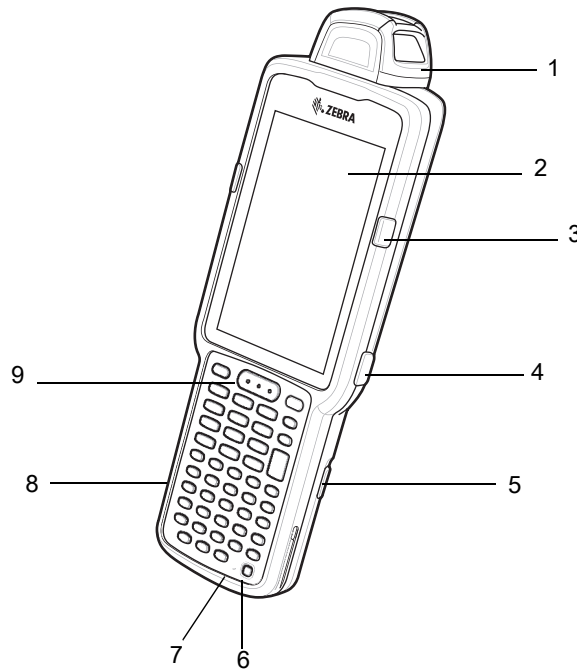

Figure 5 MC33XX-R Back View

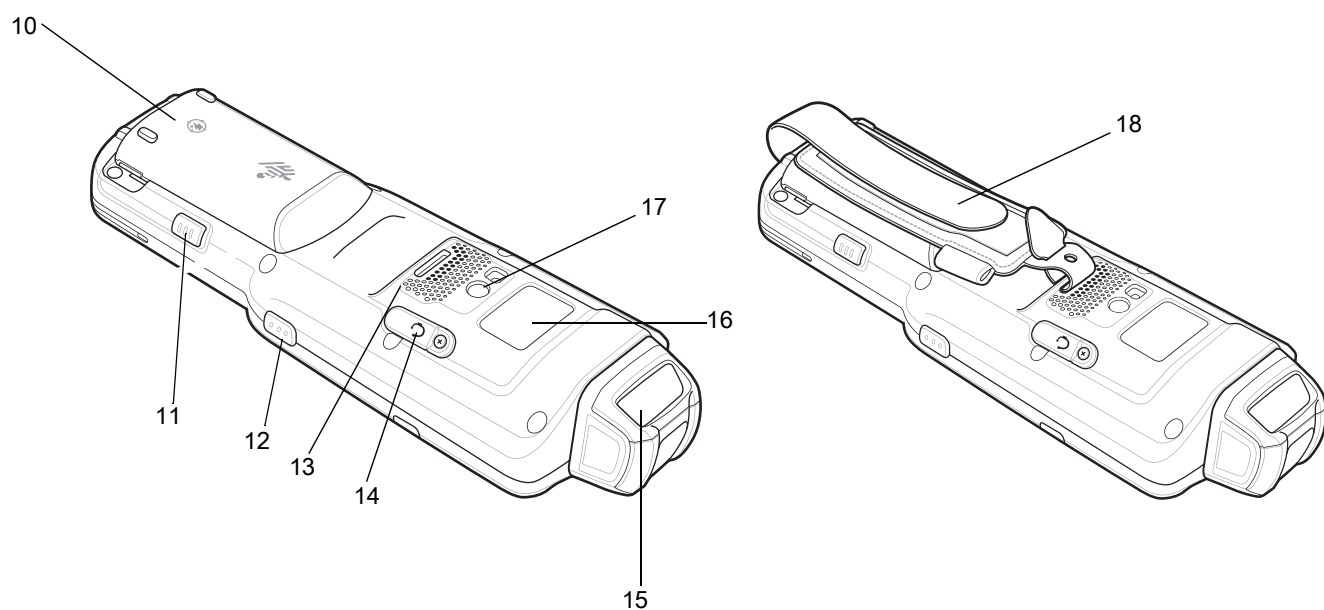

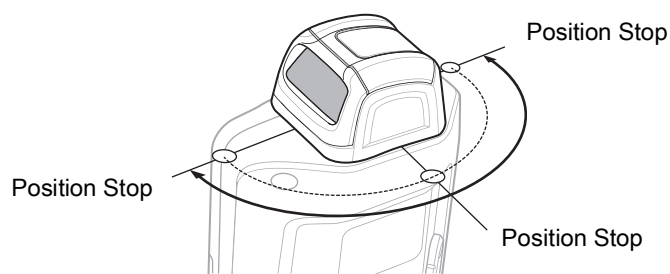

Rotating Scan Turret

The MC33XX-R features a Rotating Turret with three position stops. This feature offers greater scanning flexibility.



CAUTION: Do not try to rotate the turret past the side position stops. Damage to device may occur.

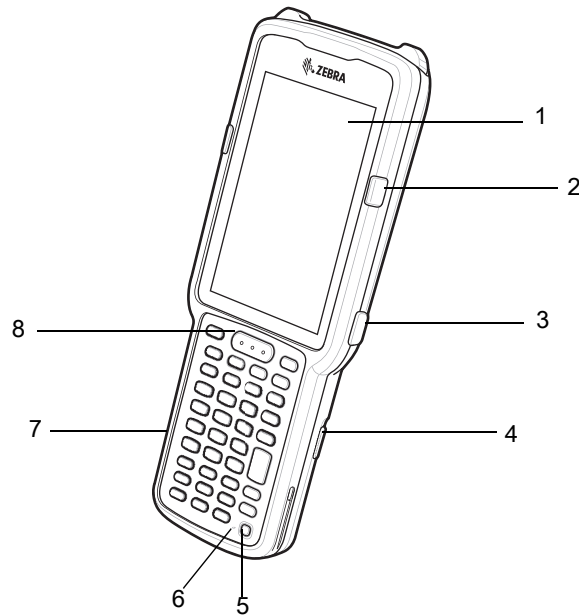

Figure 8 MC33XX-S Back View

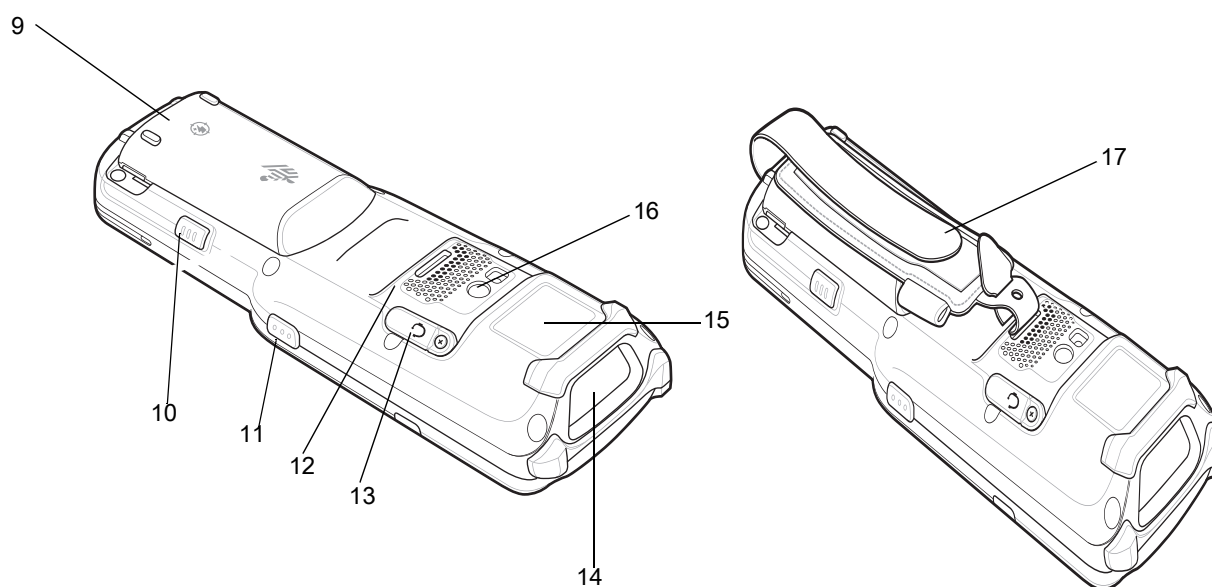

Unpacking

Carefully remove all protective material from the MC33XX and save the shipping container for later storage and shipping.

Verify the following items are in the box:

- MC33XX
- Lithium-ion battery
- Regulatory Guide.

Setup

To start using the MC33XX for the first time:

- Install a microSD card (optional)
- Install the battery
- Charge the MC33XX
- Power on the MC33XX.

Installing a microSD Card

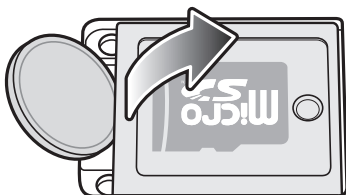
The microSD card slot provides secondary non-volatile storage. The slot is located under the battery pack. Refer to the documentation provided with the card for more information, and follow the manufacturer's recommendations for use.



CAUTION: Follow proper electrostatic discharge (ESD) precautions to avoid damaging the microSD card. Proper ESD precautions include, but are not limited to, working on an ESD mat and ensuring that the operator is properly grounded.

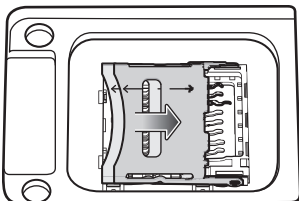
1. Using a coin or finger, remove the microSD card cover.

Figure 9 Remove microSD Card Cover



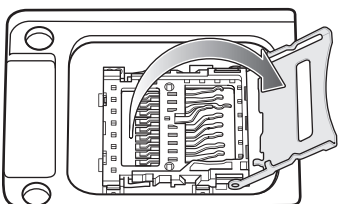
2. Slide the microSD card holder to the Open position.

Figure 10 Unlock microSD Card Holder



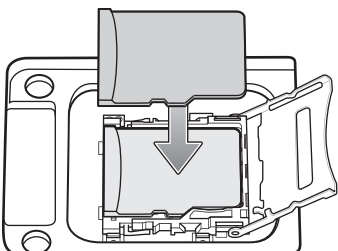
3. Lift the microSD card holder.

Figure 11 Lift microSD Card Holder



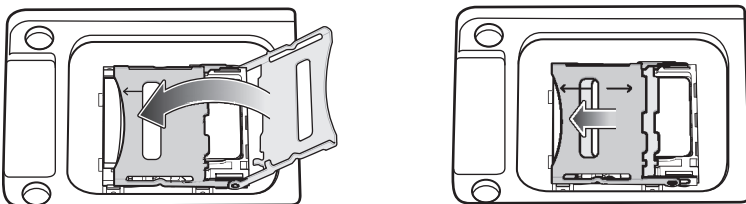
4. Place the microSD card into the contact area with the contacts facing down.

Figure 12 Install microSD Card



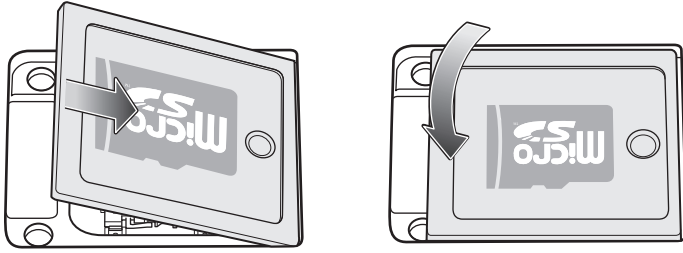
5. Close the microSD card holder and slide the microSD card holder to the Lock position.

Installing the MC33XX-G Battery

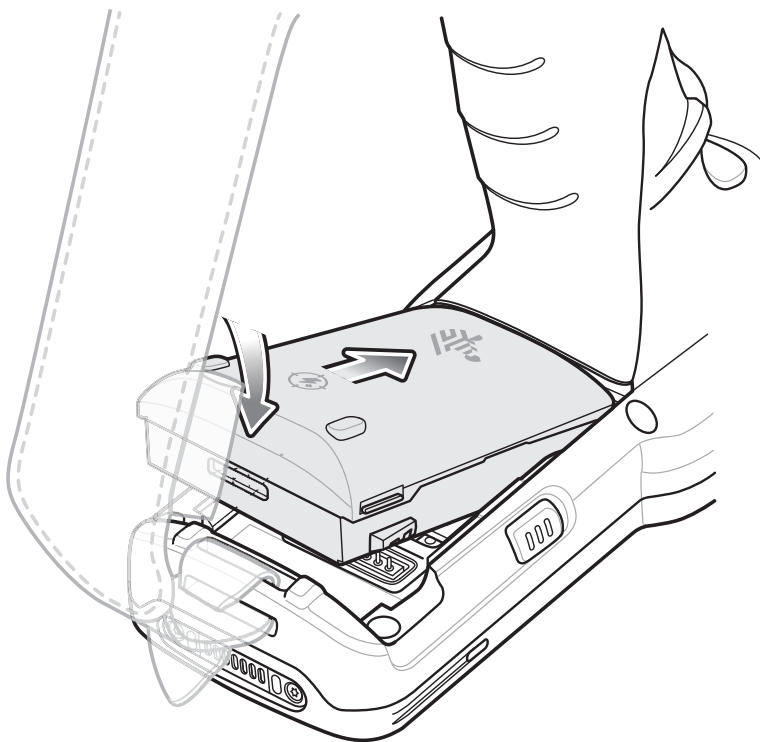
The MC33XX-G is compatible with the following batteries:

- MC33XX 5200 mAh PowerPrecision+ extended battery.
- MC32N0 5200 mAh PowerPrecision extended battery.

To install the battery:

1. Loosen the hand strap, if needed.
2. Align the battery into the battery compartment.

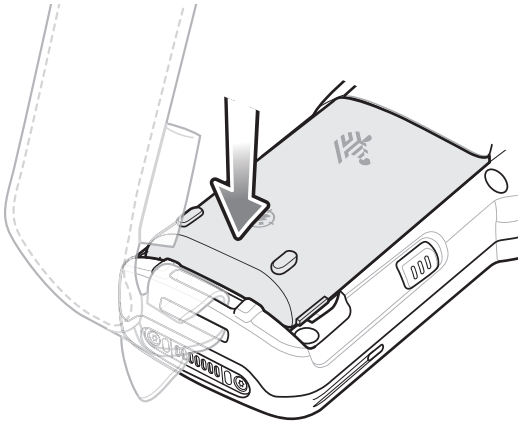
Figure 15 Inserting the Battery

The MC33XX-R/S is compatible with the following batteries:

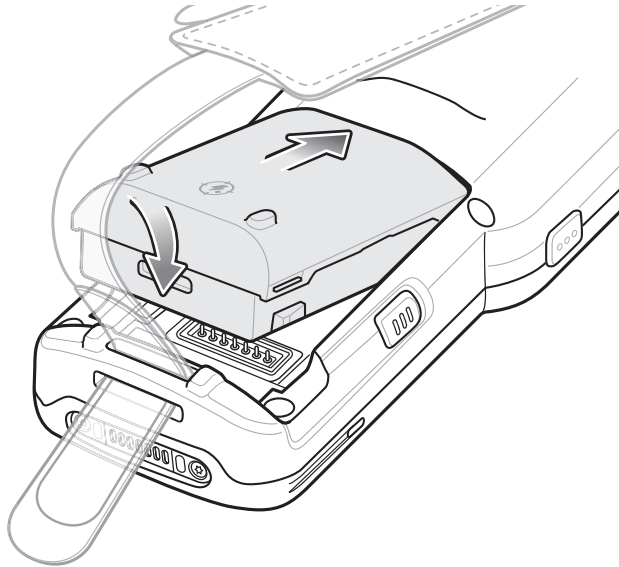
- MC33XX 2740 mAh PowerPrecision+ standard battery.
- MC33XX 5200 mAh PowerPrecision+ extended battery.
- MC32N0 2740 mAh PowerPrecision standard battery.
- MC32N0 5200 mAh PowerPrecision extended battery.

To install the battery:

1. Loosen the hand strap, if needed.

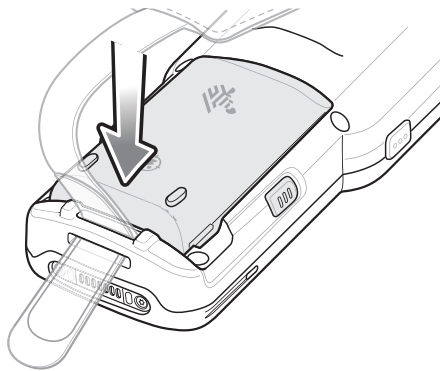
2. Align the top of the battery into the battery compartment.

Charging the Battery



CAUTION: Ensure that you follow the guidelines for battery safety described in Battery Safety Guidelines on page 187.

Use the mobile computer cradles, cables and spare battery chargers to charge the mobile computer main battery.

The main battery can be charged before insertion into the mobile computer or after it is installed. There are two main batteries for the MC33XX, the 2740 mAh PowerPrecision+ standard battery (1X) and the 5200 mAh PowerPrecision+ extended battery (2X). The MC33XX-G is compatible with the 5200 mAh PowerPrecision+ extended battery. The MC33XX-R/S are compatible with both the 2740 mAh PowerPrecision+ standard battery and the 5200 mAh PowerPrecision+ extended battery. Use one of the spare battery chargers to charge the main battery (out of the mobile computer) or one of the cradles to charge the main battery while it is installed in the mobile computer.

Before using the mobile computer for the first time, fully charge the main battery until the green Charge LED indicator remains lit and charge the battery using a cable or a cradle with the appropriate power supply. For information about the accessories available for the MC33XX, see Accessories. The 2740 mAh PowerPrecision+ standard battery fully charges (0% to 90% capacity) in less than 2.2 hours and the 5200 mAh PowerPrecision+ extended battery fully charges (0% to 90% capacity) in less than 3.8 hours.

The MC33XX retains data in memory for at least five minutes when the mobile computer's main battery is removed.

When the main battery reaches a very low battery state, the battery retains data in memory for at least 15 hours.

Batteries must be charged within the 0° to +40° C (32° to 104° F) ambient temperature range.

The following accessories can be used to charge batteries:

- Cradles (and a power supply):
 - 1-Slot USB Charge Cradle
 - 5-Slot Charge Only ShareCradle
 - 5-Slot Ethernet ShareCradle
 - 5-Slot Charge ShareCradle + 4-Slot Spare Battery Charger
 - 5-Slot Ethernet ShareCradle + 4-Slot Spare Battery Charger.
- Cables (and a power supply):
 - USB Charge Cable.
- Spare Battery Chargers (and a power supply):
 - 4-Slot Spare Battery Charger
 - 20-Slot Spare Battery Charger.



NOTE: It is safe to leave the mobile computer and/or batteries on the charger for prolonged durations. Both the spare and terminal-based chargers stop charging when they detect that the battery is fully charged. Upon stopping, the batteries will slowly self-discharge, and if left on the charger long enough, will eventually fall to a point where the charger re-initiates a charge until the batteries are fully charged again.

To charge the mobile computer using the cradles:

1. Insert the mobile computer into a cradle. See Accessories for accessory setup.
2. The mobile computer starts to charge automatically. The Charge LED Indicator indicates the charge status. See the table below for charging indications.

To charge the mobile computer using the cables:

1. Connect the MC33XX Communication/Charge Cable to the appropriate power source and connect to the mobile computer. See Accessories for accessory setup.
2. The mobile computer starts to charge automatically. The Charge LED Indicator indicates the charge status.

| Status | Indications |

The MC33XX 2740 mAh PowerPrecision+ standard battery charges from 0% to 90% in less than 2.2 hours at room temperature.

The MC33XX 5200 mAh PowerPrecision+ extended battery charges from 0% to 90% in less than 3.8 hours at room temperature.

The MC32N0 2740 mAh PowerPrecision standard battery charges from 0% to 90% in less than 3 hours at room temperature.

The MC32N0 5200 mAh PowerPrecision extended battery charges from 0% to 90% in less than 5.5 hours at room temperature.

Backup Power

The device is equipped with a supercapacitor (supercap) to provide backup power to the device when the main battery is removed. The supercap will retain random access memory (RAM) data in memory for approximately five minutes after the main battery is removed during Hot Swap.



IMPORTANT: The supercap is automatically charged from the main battery and requires approximately ten minutes to fully charge.

Charging Temperature

Charge batteries in ambient temperatures from 0°C to 40°C (32°F to 104°F) or up to 45°C (113°F) as reported by the battery. To view battery temperature, swipe up from the bottom of the Home screen and touch **Settings** > **System** > **About phone** > **Battery information**.

The device or cradle always performs battery charging in a safe and intelligent manner. At higher temperatures (for example, approximately +37°C (+98°F)) the device or cradle may for small periods of time alternately enable and disable battery charging to keep the battery at acceptable temperatures. The device and cradle indicates when charging is disabled due to abnormal temperatures via its LED.

Charging Spare Batteries

See the Accessories section for information on using accessories to charge spare batteries.

Hot Swap Mode

The device provides a Hot Swap mode where the user can replace the battery without powering off the device. When the user removes the battery, the display turns off and the device enters a low power state while in Hot Swap mode. In Hot Swap mode, the device retains RAM data for approximately 5 minutes. Replace the battery within 5 minutes to preserve memory persistence. If the user does not install a charged battery within 5 minutes, data in RAM will be lost. During Hot Swap mode, Wi-Fi and Bluetooth remain connected for 30 seconds. If the battery is not inserted within 30 seconds, Wi-Fi is disabled and then re-enabled when the device comes out of Hot Swap mode and Bluetooth is reset when the device comes out of Hot Swap mode.



IMPORTANT: The supercap requires time to recharge after performing a Hot Swap or after the main battery is fully depleted. Hot Swap mode will not retain data unless the supercap is fully charged.

Google Account Setup



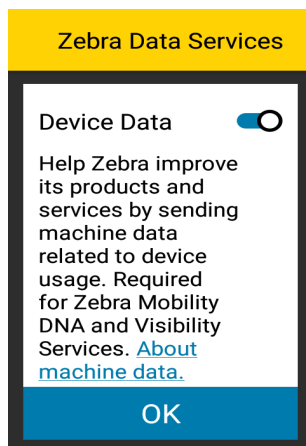
NOTE: The device has to be connected to the internet in order to set up a Google™ account. A Google account is only required on devices with GMS software.

The first time the device starts, the Setup Wizard displays. Follow the on-screen instructions to set up a Google account, configure Google Pay™ for purchasing items from the Google Play™ store, to enter your personal information, and enable backup/restore features.

Zebra Visibility Services

The device captures and provides device analytics to a system administrator. The first time the device boots (or after a Factory reset), the **Zebra Services** agreement screen displays.

Touch the **Device Data** switch to disable the device from sending analytics data.

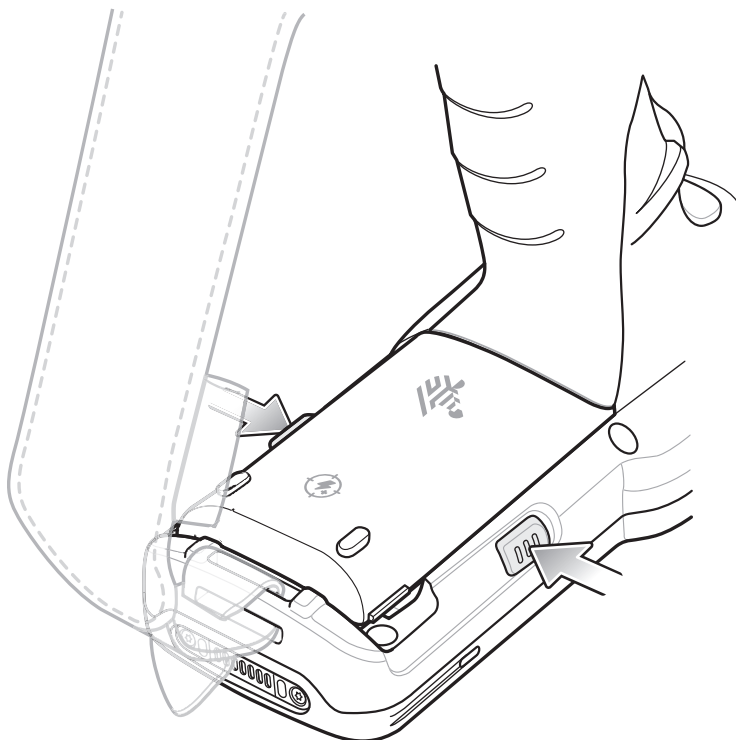
Replacing the Battery in the MC33XX-G

To replace the battery:

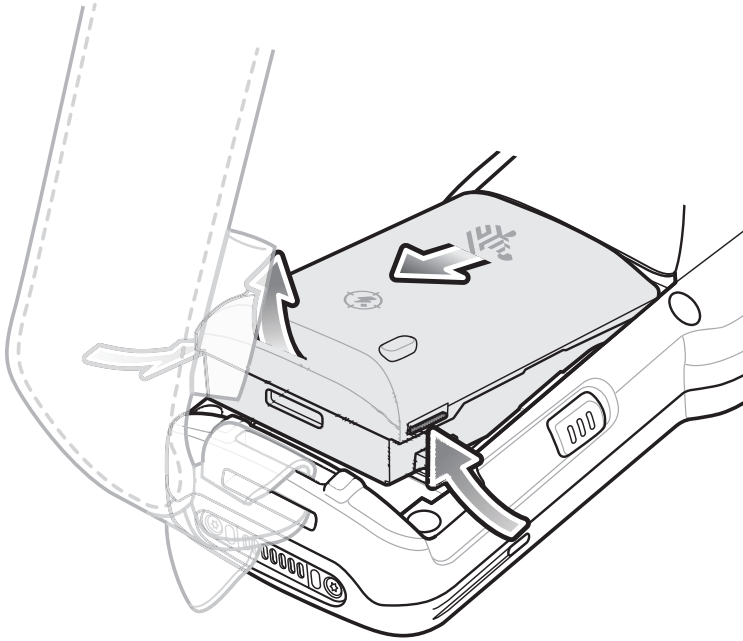

Figure 20 Release Battery



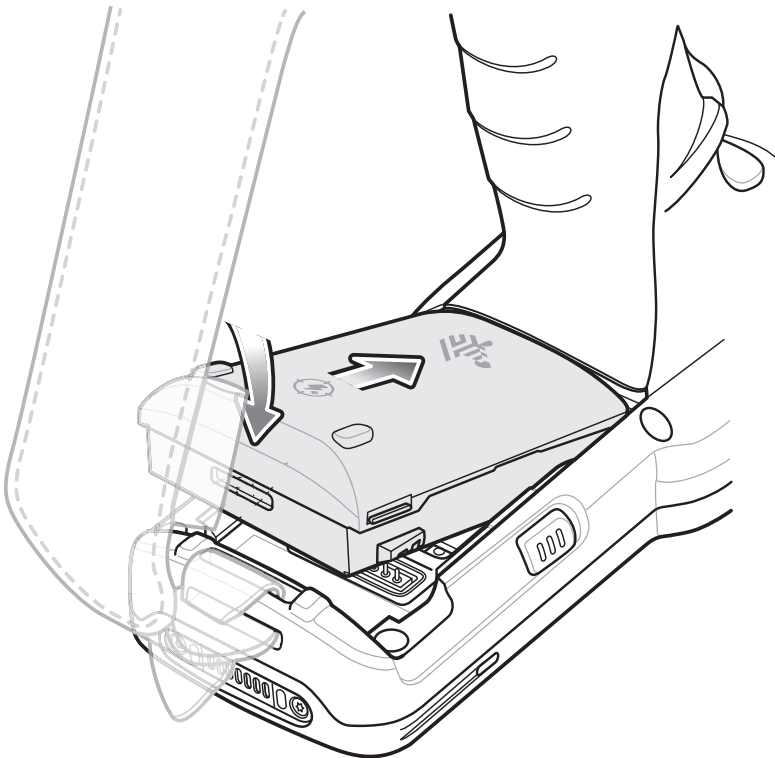

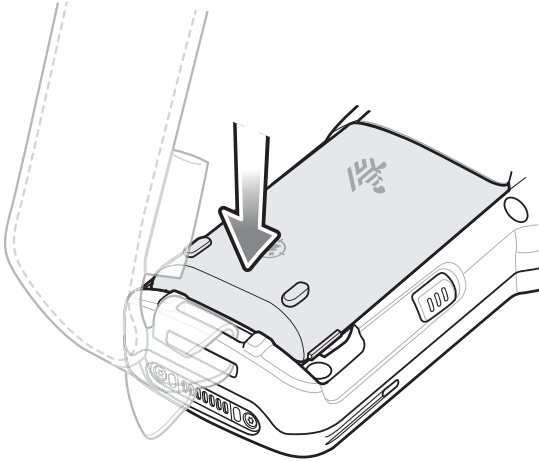

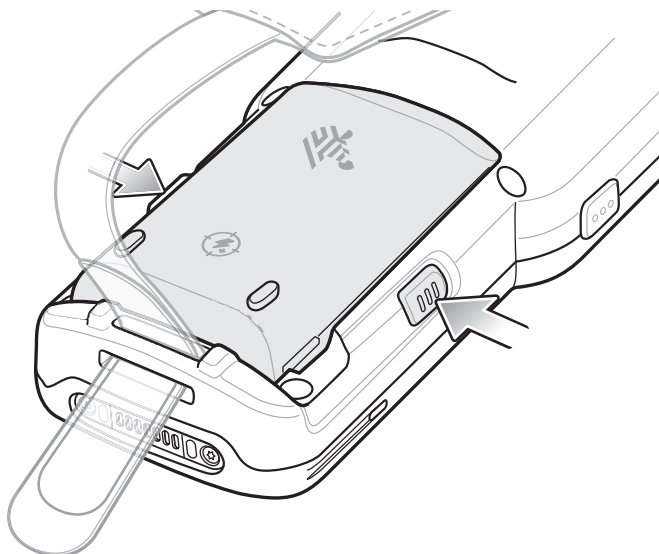

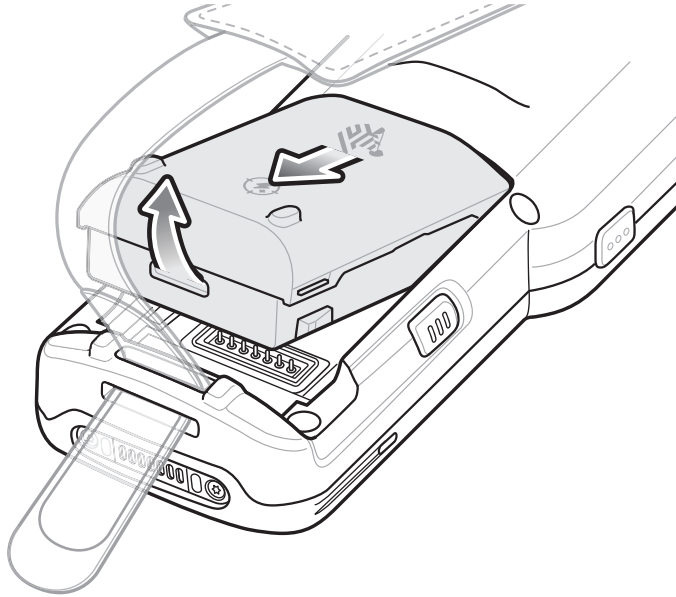

Figure 24 Release Battery



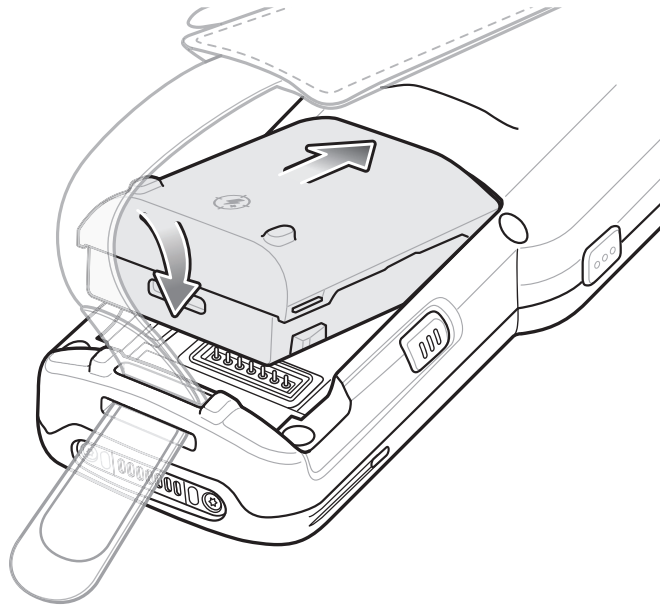

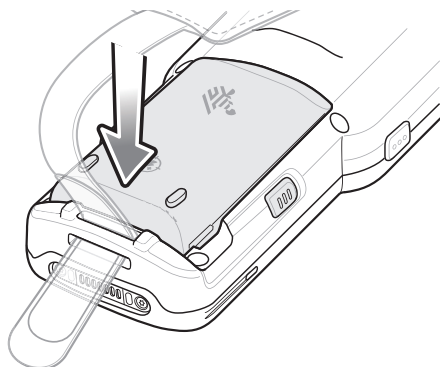
Figure 26 Inserting the Battery

Battery Management



NOTE: Prior to checking the battery charge level, remove the device from any AC power source (cradle or cable).

To check the charge status of the main battery, open **Settings** and touch **System > About phone > Battery Information**.



IMPORTANT: At temperatures below 0°C, the Battery level may report a reduced value. This is normal due to temperature compensation.

Battery present status indicates if the battery is present and **Battery level** lists the battery charge (as a percentage of fully charged). The battery percentage can also be viewed next to the battery icon in the quick access panel. Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel.

Monitoring Battery Usage

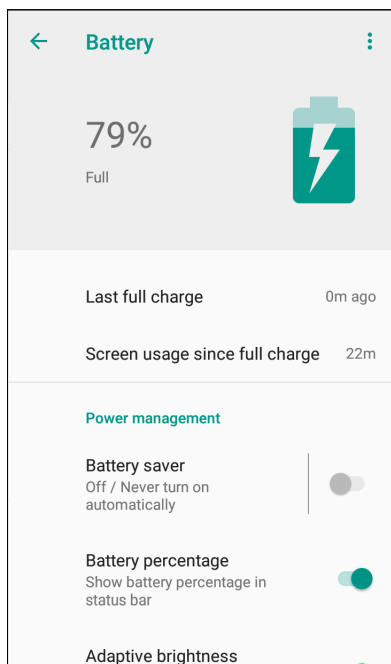
The **Battery** screen provides battery charge details, power management options, and a list of apps that consume the most battery power.

Use the power management options to extend battery life, or touch an app to display details about its power consumption. Different apps display different information. Some apps include buttons that open screens with settings to adjust power use. Use the **DISABLE** or **FORCE CLOSE** buttons to turn off apps that consume too much power.

Low Battery Notification

When the battery charge drops below 23% (MC33XX 2740 mAh PowerPrecision+ standard battery) or 15% (MC33XX 5200 mAh PowerPrecision+ extended battery) to a low level, the MC33XX displays a notice to connect the MC33XX to power. The user should charge the battery using one of the charging accessories.

When the battery charge drops below 15% (MC33XX 2740 mAh PowerPrecision+ standard battery) or 8% (MC33XX 5200 mAh PowerPrecision+ extended battery) to a very low level, the MC33XX displays a notice to connect the MC33XX to power. The user should charge the battery using one of the charging accessories.

When the battery charge drops below 8% (MC33XX 2740 mAh PowerPrecision+ standard battery) or 4% (MC33XX 5200 mAh PowerPrecision+ extended battery), the MC33XX goes into critical suspend mode to save data. The screen turns off.

The user must replace the battery or charge the MC33XX using one of the charging accessories to retain data.

Battery Optimization

Observe the following battery saving tips:

- Set the screen to turn off after a short period of non-use.
- Reduce screen brightness.
- Turn off all wireless radios when not in use.
- Turn off automatic syncing for Email, Calendar, Contacts, and other apps.
- Minimize use of apps that keep the device from suspending, for example, music and video apps.

Turning Off the Radios

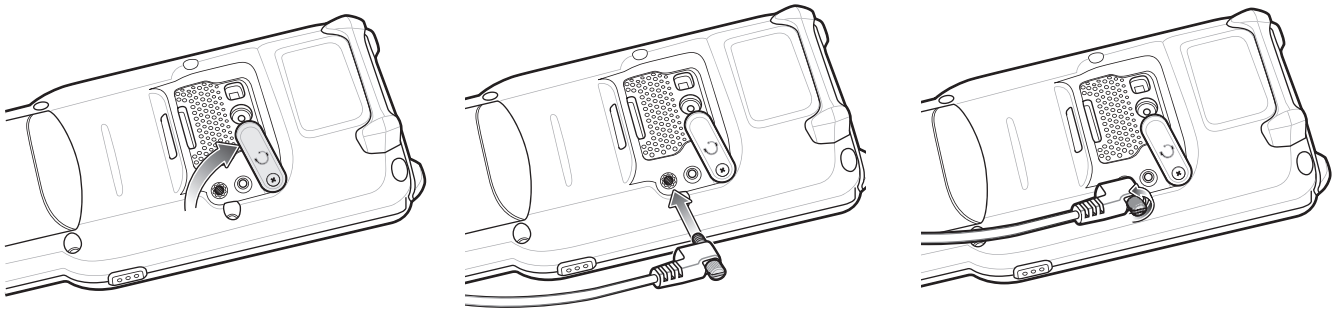

Real-Time Clock Backup

The device provides a Real-time Clock (RTC) backup feature. After boot-up, the device saves the system time in a file in persistent storage. When the device re-boots, it compares the system time to the time saved in a file. If the system time is not the latest, it restores the time from the file.

Setting the Date and Time

You are only required to set the time zone or set the date and time if the wireless LAN does not support Network Time Protocol (NTP).

To set the date and time:

1. Swipe down from the Status bar to open the Quick Settings bar and then touch ⚙.
2. Touch **System > Date & time**.
3. Touch **Automatic date & time** to disable automatic date and time synchronization.

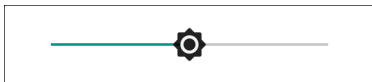

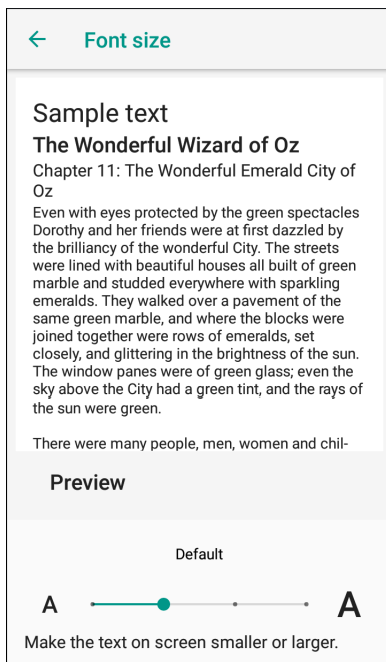

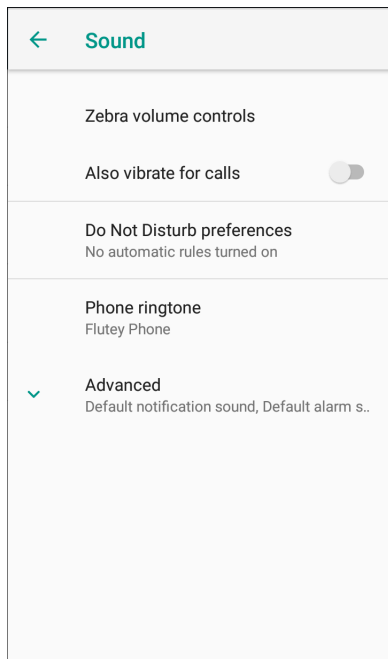

- **Zebra volume controls**
 - **Ring volume** - Controls the ringtone volume.
 - **Media volume** - Controls the music, games, and media volume.
 - **Alarm volume** - Controls the alarm clock volume.
 - **Notifications volume** - Controls the notification volume.
 - **Scanner volume** - Controls the scanner volume.
 - **Volume presets**
 -  - Mutes the ring, notifications, and scanner so that the device does not make sounds or vibrate.
 -  - All sounds except media and alarms are silenced and vibrate mode is active.

 - **Block when screen is off** - This option prevents notifications from turning on the screen or pulsing the LED light when a new notification is received while you are not using the device.
 - **Automatic rules** - Choose when to automatically silence the device. Touch a default rule, such as Weekend or Weeknight, or create your own rule. To create your own rule, tap **Add more** and then **Time rule**.
- **Advanced** - Touch to display advanced sound options.
 - **Default notification sound** - Touch to select a sound to play for all system notifications.
 - **Default alarm sound** - Touch to select a sound to play for alarms.
 - **Other sounds and vibrations**
 - **Screen locking sounds** - Play a sound when locking and unlocking the screen (default – enabled).
 - **Charging sounds** - Not applicable.
 - **Touch sounds** - Play a sound when making screen selections (default – enabled).
 - **Vibrate on tap** - Vibrate the device when making screen selections (default – disabled).
 - **Emergency alerts** - Touch to configure emergency broadcast settings and notifications.


Setting Device Advertisement

Device Advertisement consists of **Inactivity notification** and **Device paging** functionalities. Inactivity notification is based on the device sensor support (accelerometer). If the device doesn't have an accelerometer sensor, only the Device paging option is available.

To access Device Advertisement settings:


1. Swipe down from the Status bar to open the Quick Settings bar and then touch .
2. Touch **Device Advertisement**.
3. Select from the following options:
 - **Inactivity notification** - Enable to have the device notify the user with audible and/or LED notifications. The notification starts once the device battery level goes below the **Battery warning level** and the **Inactivity timeout** criteria is met (Default - disabled).
 - **Device paging** - The device must be connected to WLAN and be MDM managed. The MDM sends the device notification intent to the necessary device which has to be paged. This option is configurable through an MDM (StageNow, SOTI, or AirWatch) (Default - disabled).

Configurations

- **Battery warning level** - Enable **Inactivity notification** to activate this option. Set by the user. (Default - 20%).
 - **Inactivity timeout** - Enable **Inactivity notification** to activate this option. Once the device is in an idle state (not in motion) and not charging or in a cradle, this is the time period after which the device will start sending notifications. Set between 1 - 60 minutes. (Default - 30).
 - **LED notification** - Enable or disable this option to receive an LED notification.
 - **Audible notification** - Enable or disable this option to receive an audible notification.
 - **Audible timeout** - Enable this option to set the **Timeout of audible notification** option.
 - **Timeout of audible notification** - Enable **Audible timeout** to activate this option. This is the time period for which the notification is played continuously. If the **Audible timeout** is disabled and **Audible notification** is enabled, then the audio notification will keep playing without a timeout period. Set between 1-30 minutes (Default - 3).
 - **Audible type** - valid options: **Ring**, **Notification**, and **Alarm**.
 - **Audible file** - The user can select from various pre-defined files, based on the audible type, or add a custom ringtone.
4. Touch .

Wake-Up Sources

By default, the device wakes from suspend mode when the user presses the power button. The device can be configured to wake when the user presses the Trigger or the Scan button.

1. Swipe up from the bottom of the Home screen and touch **Settings > Wake-Up Sources**.
2. Touch a checkbox. A check appears in the checkbox.

Using the Device

Introduction

This chapter describes the screens, status and notification icons, and controls on the device, and provides basic instructions for using the device.

Google Mobile Services



NOTE: This section applies to Google Mobile Services (GMS) devices only.

Devices with GMS contain apps and services that provide additional functionality.

GMS includes:

- Apps - GMS adds a variety of Google apps and associated widgets including Chrome, Gmail, Drive, and Maps.
- Services:
 - Speech to Text - Allows for free format speech to text in many languages for both connected and disconnected network. Launch by touching the microphone icon on the keyboard.
 - TalkBack Service - Provides spoken feedback on various parts of the user interface. To enable, go to **Settings > Accessibility**.
 - Network Location Provider - Adds a location provider which uses mobile network tower information and Wi-Fi access point information to provide a location without using GPS. To enable, go to **Settings > Security & location > Location**.
 - Widevine DRM - Enables Digital Rights Management (DRM) so that protected streaming video content can be played. Enable DRM Info from the Google Play™ store.
 - Google Cloud Messaging - Allows the device to receive data from the server and other devices on the same connection.
 - Backup and Restore - Allows the users settings and apps to be backed up to a Google server and subsequently restored from that server after a factory reset.
 - Google Accounts - Create and use a Google account to synchronize mail, files, music, photos, contacts and calendar events.

Home Screen

Turn on the device to display the Home screen. Depending on the configuration, the Home screen may appear different. Contact your system administrator for more information.

After a suspend or screen time-out, the Home screen displays with the lock slider. Touch the screen and slide up to unlock. For screen locking information, see [Un-Locking the Screen](#).

The Home screen provides additional screens for placement of widgets and shortcuts. Swipe the screen left or right to view the additional screens.



NOTE:

By default, non-GMS devices do not have the same icons on the Home screen as GMS. Icons are shown below for example only.

Home screen icons can be configured by the user and may look different than shown.



The Home screen consists of the following:

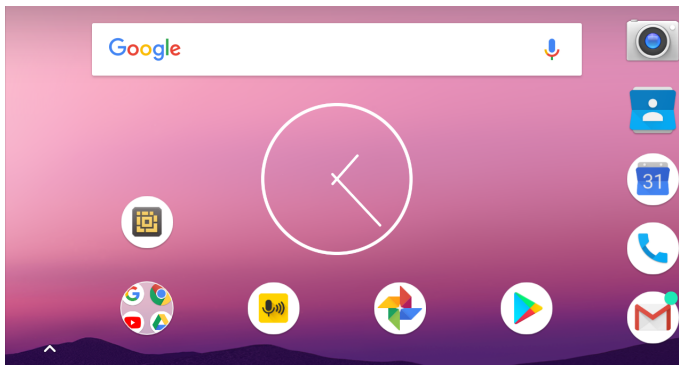















Figure 35 Notification and Status Icons



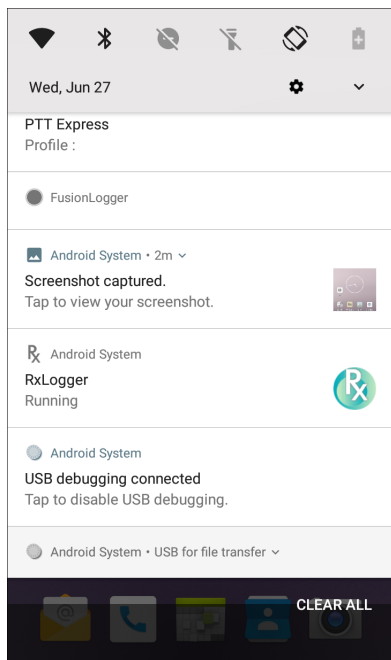

Managing Notifications

Notification icons report the arrival of new messages, calendar events, alarms, and ongoing events. When a notification occurs, an icon appears in the Status bar with a brief description. See Notification Icons for a list of possible notification icons and their description. Open the Notification panel to view a list of all the notifications.

To open the Notification panel, drag the Status bar down from the top of the screen.

To respond to a notification, open the Notification panel and then touch a notification. The Notification panel closes and the corresponding app opens.

To clear all notifications, open the Notification panel and then touch **CLEAR ALL**. All event-based notifications are removed. Ongoing notifications remain in the list.


To close the Notification panel, swipe the Notification panel up.

Setting App Notifications

To set notification settings for a specific app:


1. Swipe down from the Status bar to open the Quick Settings bar and then touch .
2. Touch **Apps & notifications > Notifications > App notifications**.
3. Select an app.
4. Select an available option:
 - **On / Off** - Select to turn all notifications from this app **On** (default) or **Off**.
 - **Allow notification dot** - Do not allow this app to add a notification dot to the app icon.
 - **Allow interruptions** - Do not allow notifications from this app to make sound, vibrate, or pop notifications on the screen.
 - **Override Do Not Disturb** - Allow these notifications to interrupt when Do Not Disturb is set to Priority Only.
 - **Categories** - Do not allow specific types of notifications from this app.
 - **Additional settings in the app** - Open the app settings.



NOTE: To change the notification settings for an app, slide the notification slightly left or right and touch .


Viewing Notification Settings for All Apps

To view the notification settings for all apps:

1. Swipe down from the Status bar to open the Quick Settings bar and then touch .
2. Touch **Apps & Notifications**.
3. Scroll down to **Notifications** to view how many apps have notifications turned off.
4. To set or view notifications settings for a specific app, see Setting App Notifications.

Controlling Lock Screen Notifications


To control whether notifications can be seen when the device is locked:

1. Swipe down from the Status bar to open the Quick Settings bar and then touch .
2. Touch **Apps & notifications > Notifications**.
3. Touch **On the lock screen** and select one of the following:
 - **Show all notification content** (default)
 - **Don't show notifications at all**.

Blink Light

The Notification LED lights blue when an app, such as email and VoIP, generates a programmable notification or to indicate when the device is connected to a Bluetooth device. By default, LED notifications are enabled.

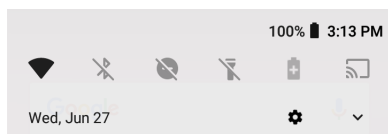

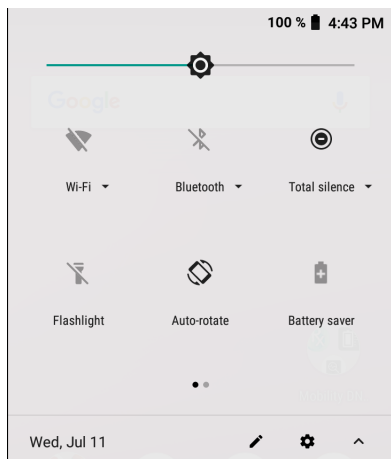

To change a setting, touch the icon:

- Display brightness - Use the slider to decrease or increase the brightness of the screen.
- Wi-Fi network - Turn Wi-Fi on or off. To open Wi-Fi settings, touch the Wi-Fi network name.
- Bluetooth settings - Turn Bluetooth on or off. To open Bluetooth settings, touch **Bluetooth**.
- Battery power - Indicates percentage of battery power remaining. Touch to view battery usage.
- Do not disturb - Control how and when to receive notifications.
- Airplane mode - Turn Airplane mode on or off. When Airplane mode is on the device does not connect to Wi-Fi or Bluetooth.
- Auto-rotate - Lock the device's orientation in portrait or landscape mode or set to automatically rotate.
- Flashlight - Turn flashlight on or off. Turn camera flash on or off.


The thermal protection safety feature for the camera provides the following behavior if the temperature range is 40°C or above:


- If the flashlight is kept on for a certain period of time, it is automatically turned off and cannot be turned back on for a period of time until it has cooled off.
- During the cooling off period, the camera cannot be turned on. If you attempt to use the camera, a message displays indicating to try again after a period of time.
- Cast - Share phone content on Chromecast or a television with Google Cast built-in. Touch cast screen to display a list of devices, then touch a device to begin casting.

Editing Icons on Quick Settings



The first several setting tiles from the Quick Access panel become the Quick Settings bar.

To move a setting tile:



1. Open the Quick Access panel.
2. Touch .

3. Touch and drag a setting tile to another location.
4. Release the tile.
5. Touch  to save tiles and return to the Quick Access panel.

To add a setting tile:

1. Open the Quick Access panel.
2. Touch .
3. Slide the Quick Settings panel up to reveal additional tiles.
4. Touch and drag a setting tile from the **Drag to add tiles** area to the main area.
5. Release the tile.
6. Touch  to save tiles and return to Quick Access panel.

To remove a setting tile:

1. Open the Quick Access panel.
2. Touch .
3. Touch and drag a setting tile to the **Drag here to remove** area.
4. Release the tile.
5. Touch  to save tiles and return to Quick Access panel.

App Shortcuts and Widgets

App shortcuts placed on the Home screen allow quick and easy access to apps. Widgets are self-contained apps placed on the Home screen to access frequently used features.

Adding an App Shortcut to the Home Screen

To add an app shortcut to the Home screen:

1. Go to the desired Home screen.
2. Swipe up from the bottom of the screen.
3. Scroll through the list to find the app icon.
4. Touch and hold the icon until the Home screen appears.
5. Position the icon on the screen and then release.

Adding a Widget to the Home Screen

To add a widget to the Home screen:

1. Go to the desired Home screen.
2. Touch and hold until the menu appears.
3. Touch **WIDGETS**.

4. Scroll through the list to find the widget.
5. Touch and hold the widget until the Home screen appears.
6. Position the widget on the screen and then release.

Moving Items on the Home Screen

To move app shortcuts or widgets on the Home screen:

1. Touch and hold the item until it floats on the screen.
2. Drag the item to a new location. Pause at the edge of the screen to drag the item onto an adjacent Home screen.
3. Lift finger to place the item on the Home screen.

Removing an App Shortcut or Widget from the Home Screen

To remove an app shortcut or widget from the Home screen:

1. Go to the desired Home screen.
2. Touch and hold the app shortcut or widget icon until it floats on the screen.
3. Drag the icon to **X Remove** at the top of the screen and then release.

Folders

Use **Folders** to organize similar applications together. Tap the folder to open and display items in the folder.

Creating a Folder

There must be at least two app icons on the Home screen.

To create a folder:

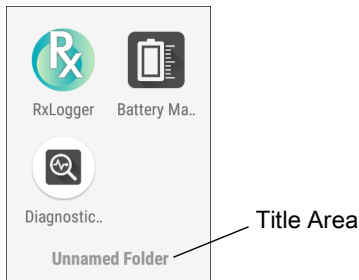
1. Go to the desired Home screen.
2. Touch and hold one app icon.
3. Drag the icon and stack on top of another icon.
4. Lift and release.

Naming Folders

To name a folder:

1. Touch the folder.

Removing a Folder

Home Screen Wallpaper

To change the Home screen wallpaper:

1. Touch and hold the screen until the menu appears.
2. Touch **WALLPAPERS**.

4. Touch **Set wallpaper**.

Using the Touchscreen

Use the multi-tap sensitive screen to operate the device.

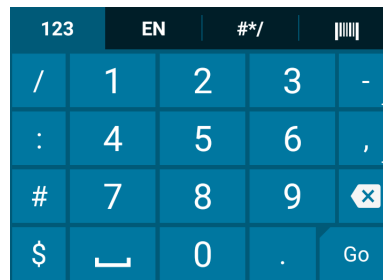
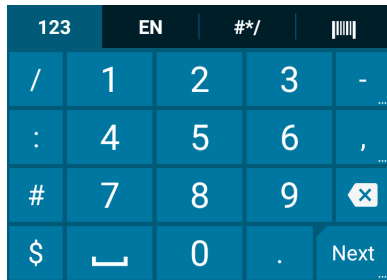

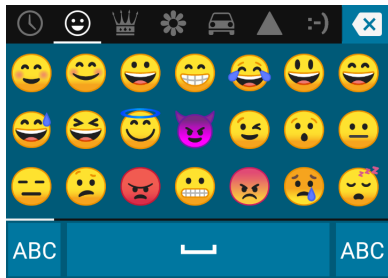

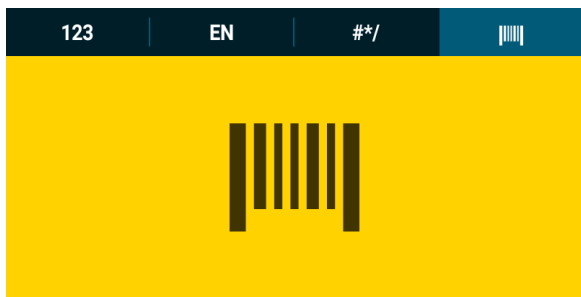

Using the Android and Gboard Keyboards

Use the Android or Gboard keyboards to enter text in a text field. To configure the keyboard settings, touch and hold , (comma) and then select **Android keyboard settings**.

Editing Text

Edit entered text and use menu commands to cut, copy, and paste text within or across apps. Some apps do not support editing some or all of the text they display; others may offer their own way to select text.

Entering Numbers, Symbols, and Special Characters

To enter numbers and symbols:

- Touch and hold one of the top-row keys until a menu appears then select a number or special character.
- Touch the Shift key once for a single capital letter. Touch the Shift key twice to lock in uppercase. Touch the Shift key a third time to unlock Capslock.
- Touch **?123** to switch to the numbers and symbols keyboard.
- Touch the **=\<** key on the numbers and symbols keyboard to view additional symbols.

To enter special characters, touch and hold a number or symbol key to open a menu of additional symbols. A larger version of the key displays briefly over the keyboard.

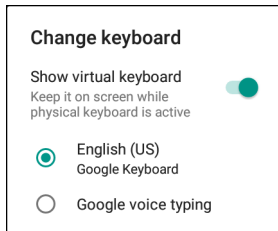

Figure 45 Hide Keyboard Option



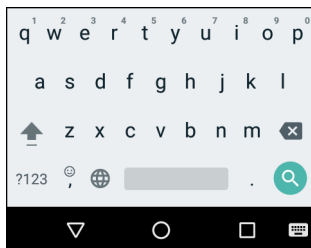

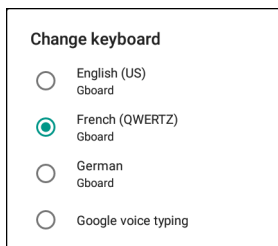

Do Not Disturb Feature

This mode mutes the device so that it does not make sounds or vibrate.

For example, use Do Not Disturb to:

- Automatically limit sounds at night or during events
- Mute interruptions other than alarms
- Get alerted to messages only from favorite contacts.

Limit Sounds and Vibrations

Mute the device completely, or let through the important alarms or important calls.

Total Silence

To completely mute the device so that it does not make a sound or vibrate, choose **Total silence**.


In Total silence mode:

- Alarms do not make noise.
- Device does not vibrate or make sounds when receiving a message, or notification.
- Sounds from music, videos, games, and other media are muted.



NOTE: All alarms are silenced in Total silence mode.

Alarms Only

To mute the device so that you hear alarms, choose **Alarms only**. This option does not mute sounds from music, videos, games, or other media.

1. Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel.
2. Touch **Do not disturb > Alarms only**.
3. Choose **Until you turn it off** or select a time period.
4. Touch **Done**.

When Alarms Only is on,  appears in the quick access panel and the Status Bar.

To turn off Alarms Only, open the Quick Access panel and touch **Alarms only**.




NOTE: To quickly turn on Alarms Only, with the screen on, press and hold the Volume Down button until the volume is all the way down. Then, press Volume Down again to turn on Alarms Only.

To turn off Alarms Only, press either the Volume Up or Volume Down button and the touch **END NOW** in the alert message.

Priority Notifications Only


To only be interrupted by important notifications, choose **Priority only**. This option does not mute sounds from music, videos, games, or other media.

Before turning on Priority Only mode, set the notification priorities:

1. Swipe down from the status bar to open the quick settings bar and then touch .
2. Touch **Sound > Do not disturb > Priority only allows**.
3. Set priorities.
 - **Alarms**: Disabled by default.
 - **Reminders** and **Events**: Switch on or off.
 - **Messages** and **Calls**: Choose **From anyone**, **From contacts only**, **From starred contacts only**, or **none**. To star contacts, use the **Contacts** applications.
 - **Repeat callers**: Choose whether to let the device ring if the same person calls again within 15 minutes.

After setting notification priorities, turn on Priority Only mode to limit interruptions. The priority notifications make a sound or vibrate based on the current ringer volume, but other notifications will be silenced.

3. Choose **Until you turn it off** or select a time period.
4. Tap **Done**.

When Priority Only is on,  appears in the quick access panel and the Status Bar.

Silence Sounds During Certain Times

To automatically silence the device during certain times, like at night or on weekends:



1. Swipe down from the Status bar to open the Quick Settings bar and then touch .
2. Touch **Sound > Do Not Disturb preferences**.
3. Touch a default **Weekend** or **Weeknight**. Or, to make a new rule, touch **Add more > Time rule**.
4. Enter a rule name.

6. Edit the new rule:
 - **Rule name** - Rename the rule.
 - **Days, Start time**, and **End time** - Set the rule's schedule.

 - **Alarm can override end time** - Allow the alarm to continue to make sound until the next alarm begins.
7. Touch the On/Off switch at the top to turn on the rule.

Silence Sounds During Events and Meetings

To automatically silence the device during events or meetings, set an event rule.

1. Swipe down from the Status bar to open the Quick Settings bar and then touch .
2. Touch **Sound > Do Not Disturb preferences**.
3. To edit the default rule, touch **Event**. Or, to create a new rule, touch **Add rule > Event rule**.
4. Edit the rule settings.
 - **Rule name** - Rename the rule.
 - **During events for** - Select which Google Calendar events the rule uses.
 - **Where reply is** - Set to: **Yes, Maybe, or Not replied, Yes or Maybe, or Yes**.
 - **Do Not Disturb preferences** - Choose whether the rule uses **Priority only, Alarms only, or Total silence**.
5. Touch the On/Off switch at the top to turn on the rule.

Turn Sounds Back On


When the device is in Do Not Disturb mode, Alarms only or Priority only display as , or Total silence displays as .

To turn off Do Not Disturb, either:

- In the Quick Access panel, touch **Alarms only, Priority only, or Total silence**.
- Press the Volume Down button and touch **End Now**.

Override Do Not Disturb for Specific Apps

To let through notifications from specific apps:

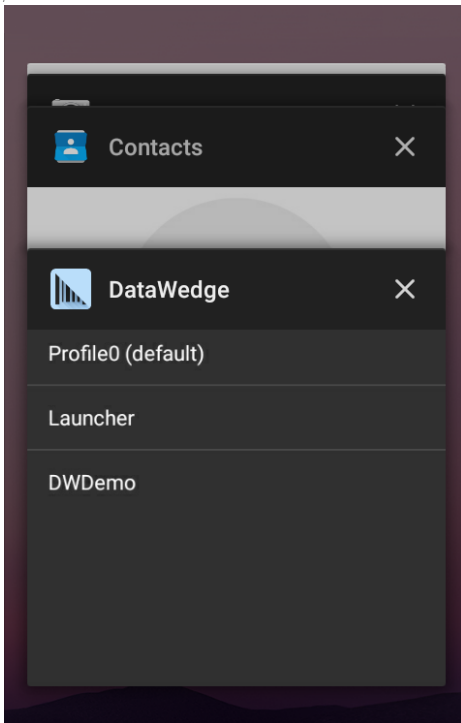

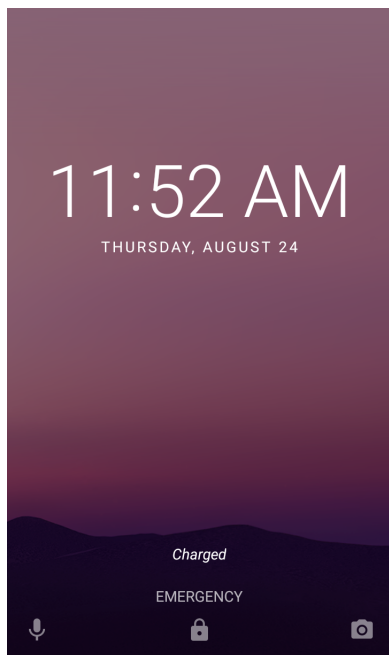


Figure 51 PIN Screen

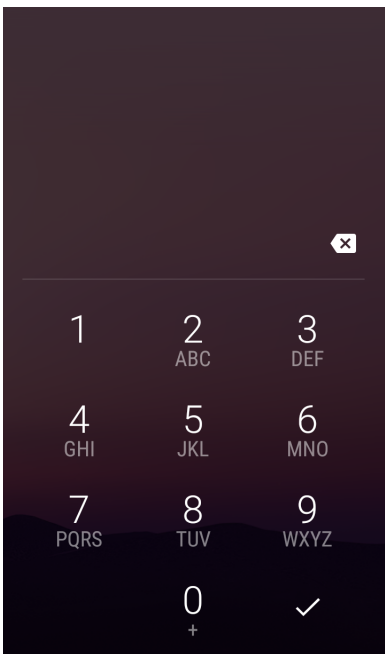
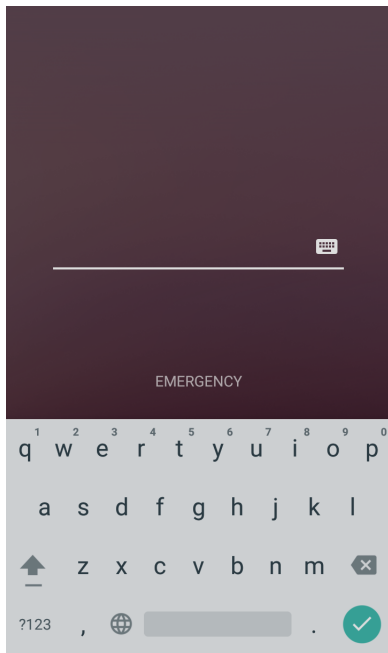


Figure 52 Pattern Screen

Interactive Sensor Technology

The MC3300 contains sensors that monitor movement and orientation:

- Gyroscope - Measures angular rotational velocity to detect rotation of the device.

- Accelerometer - Measures the linear acceleration of movement to detect the orientation of the device.

In order to take advantage of these sensors, applications use API commands. Refer to the Zebra Android EMDK for more information.

Resetting the Device

The reset functions include the following:

- Soft reset
- Hard reset
- Enterprise reset

Performing a Soft Reset

Perform a soft reset if applications stop working.

1. Press and hold the Power button until the menu appears.
2. Touch **Restart**.
The device reboots.

Performing a Hard Reset



CAUTION: Performing a hard reset with a microSD card installed in the device may cause damage or data corruption to the microSD card. All un-saved data is lost after performing a hard reset.

Perform a hard reset if the device stops responding.

1. Simultaneously press and hold the Power button, 1 and 9 keys for five seconds.
2. When the screen turns off, release the buttons.
The device reboots.

Suspend Mode

The device goes into suspend mode when you press the Power button or after a period of inactivity (set in the Display settings window).

To wake the device from Suspend mode, press the Power button. The Lock screen displays. Swipe the screen up to unlock. If the Pattern screen unlock feature is enabled, the Pattern screen appears instead of the Lock screen. If the PIN or Password screen unlock feature is enabled, enter the PIN or password after unlocking the screen. See Un-Locking the Screen.



NOTE: If you enter the PIN, password, or pattern incorrectly five times, you must wait 30 seconds before trying again. If you forget the PIN, password, or pattern contact your system administrator.

Transferring Files with a Host Computer via USB

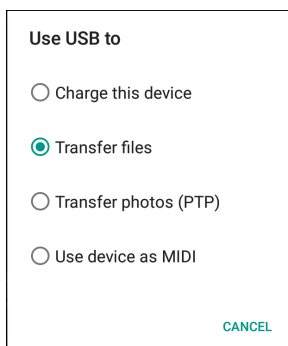

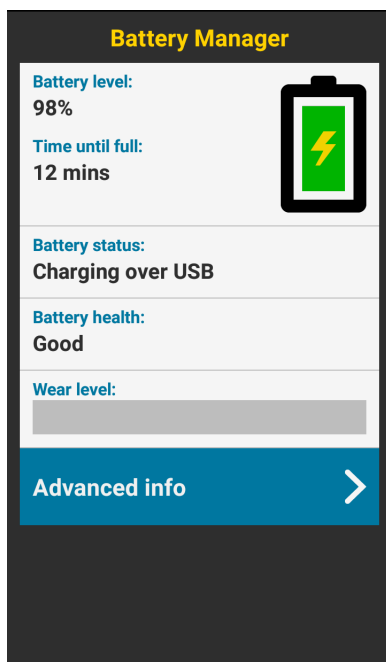

 - **Failure Detected** - A failure has been detected in the battery. See system administrator.
 - **Unknown** - See system administrator.
- **Wear level** - The health of the battery in graphical form. When the wear level exceeds 80%, the bar color changes to red.

- **Advanced info** - Touch to view additional battery information.
 - **Battery present status** - Indicates that the battery is present.
 - **Battery level** - The battery charge level as a percentage of scale.
 - **Battery scale** - The battery scale level used to determine battery level (100).
 - **Battery voltage** - The current battery voltage in millivolts.

 - **Battery current** - The average current into or out of the battery over the last second in mAh.
 - **Battery manufacture date** - The date of manufacture.
 - **Battery serial number** - The battery serial number. The number matches the serial number printed on the battery label.
 - **Battery part number** - The battery part number.
 - **Battery rated capacity** - Lists the rated capacity of the backup battery in mAh.
 - **Battery decommission status** - Indicates if the battery is past its life span.
 - **Battery Good** - The battery is in good health.
 - **Decommissioned Battery** - The battery is past its useful life and should be replaced.
 - **Base cumulative charge** - Cumulative charge using Zebra charging equipment only.

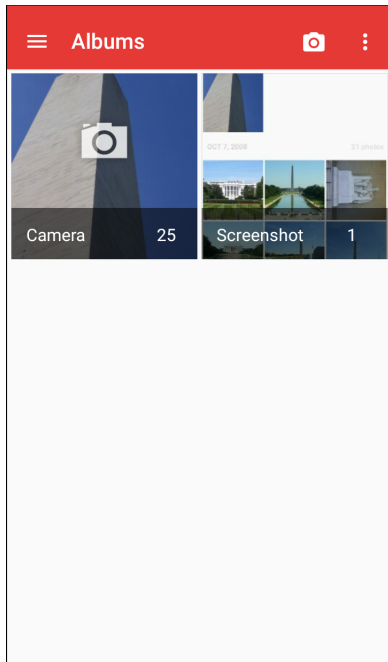

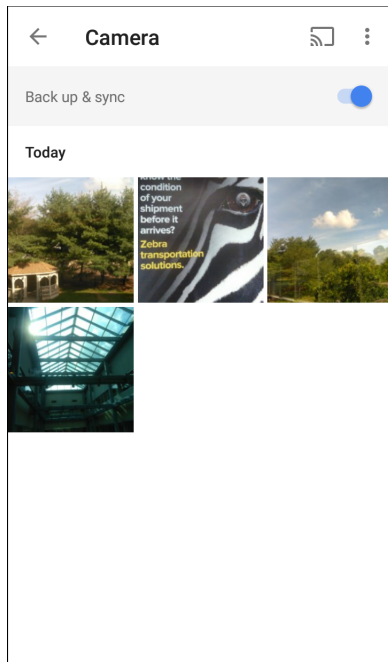

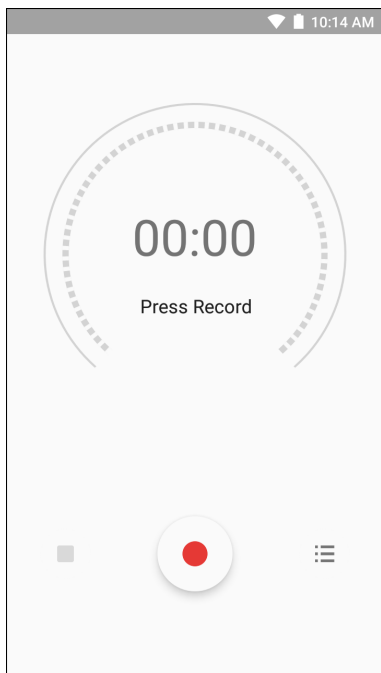

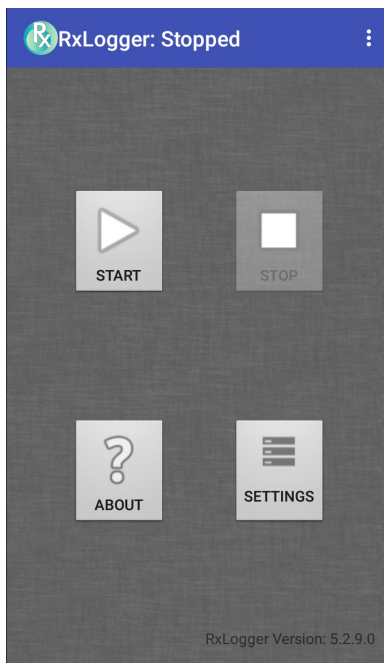

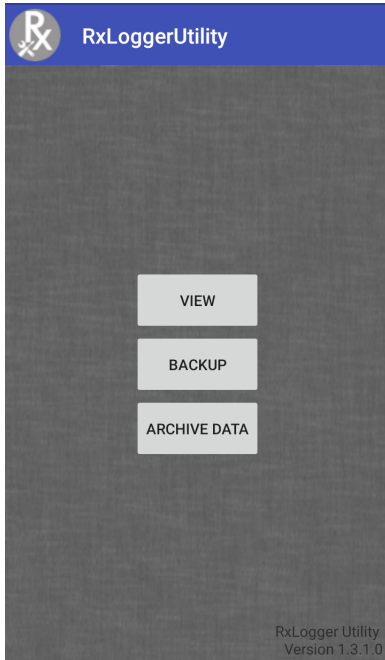

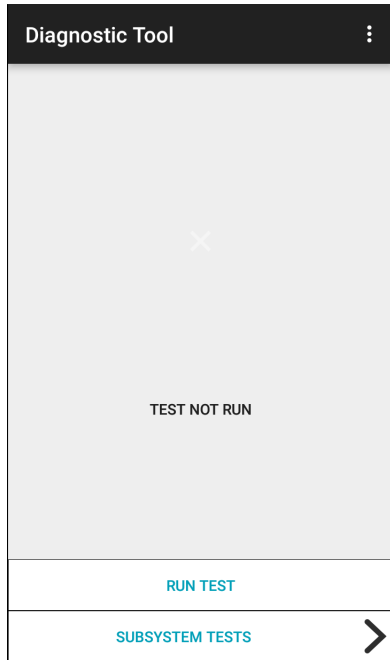

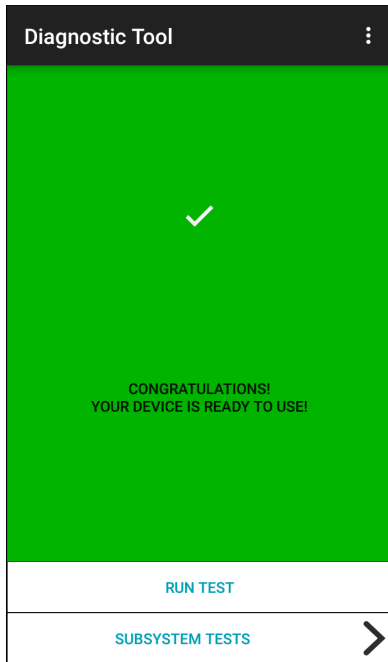
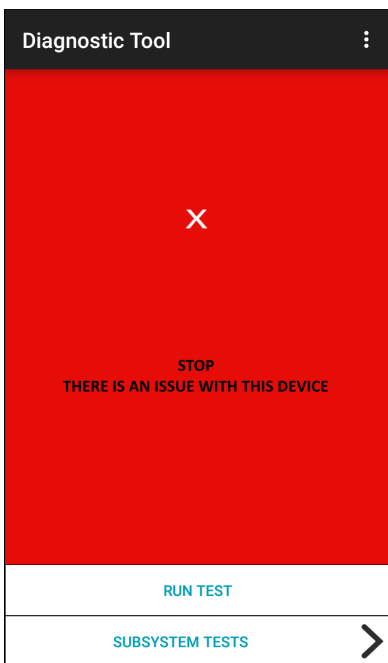
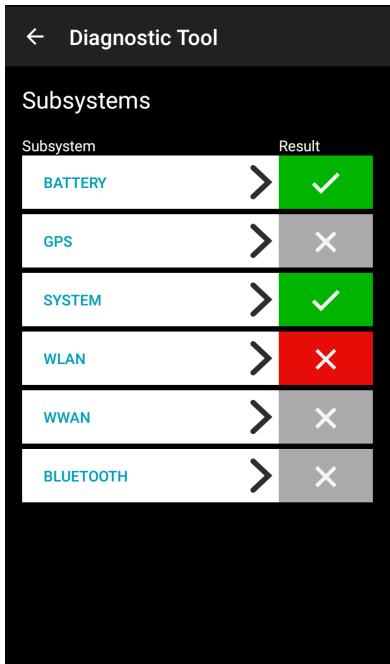


Figure 76 Test Failed Screen

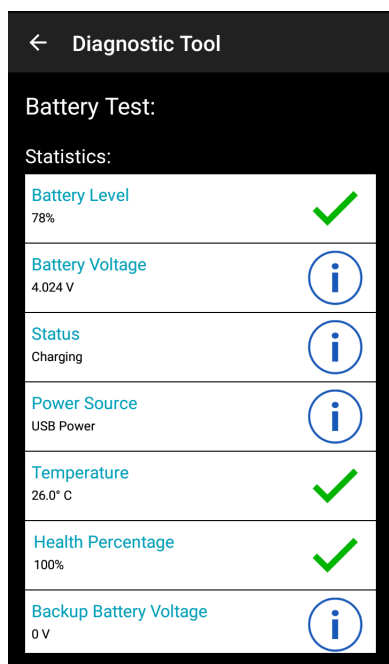

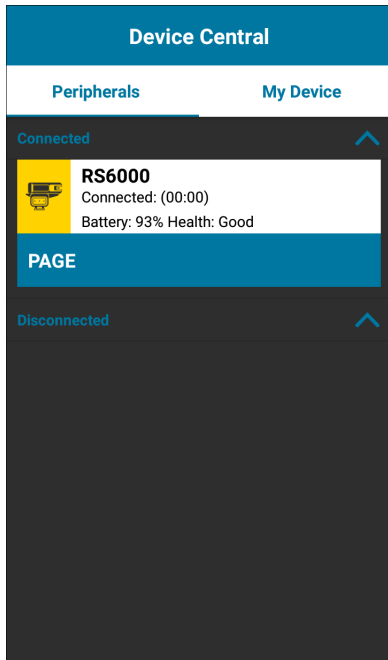

Figure 81 RS507/RS507X Hands-Free Imager

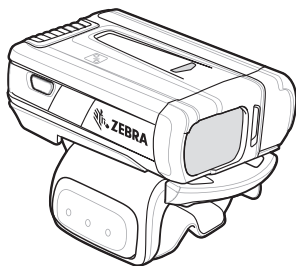

Figure 82 RS6000 Bluetooth Ring Scanner

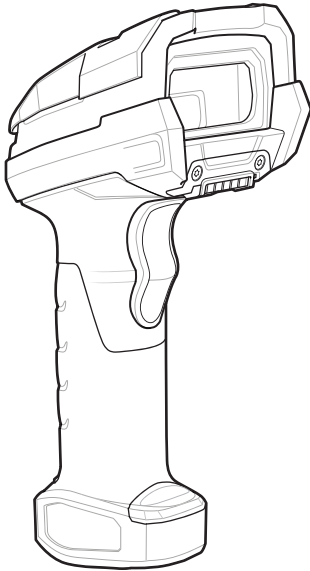

Scanning Considerations

Typically, scanning is a simple matter of aim, scan, and decode, with a few quick trial efforts to master it. However, consider the following to optimize scanning performance:

- **Range:** Scanners decode best over a particular working range — minimum and maximum distances from the barcode. This range varies according to barcode density and scanning device optics. Scan within range for quick and constant decodes; scanning too close or too far away prevents decodes. Move the scanner closer and further away to find the right working range for the barcodes being scanned.
- **Angle:** Scanning angle is important for quick decodes. When the illumination/flash reflects directly back into the imager, the specular reflection can blind/saturate the imager. To avoid this, scan the barcode so that the beam does not bounce directly back. Do not scan at too sharp an angle; the scanner needs to collect scattered reflections from the scan to make a successful decode. Practice quickly shows what tolerances to work within.
- Hold the device farther away for larger symbols.
- Move the device closer for symbols with bars that are close together.



NOTE: Scanning procedures depend on the app and device configuration. An app may use different scanning procedures from the one listed above.

Figure 84 Barcode Scanning – MC33XX-G

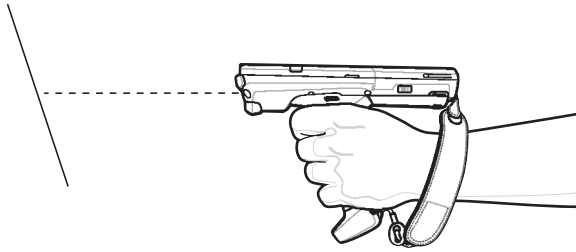
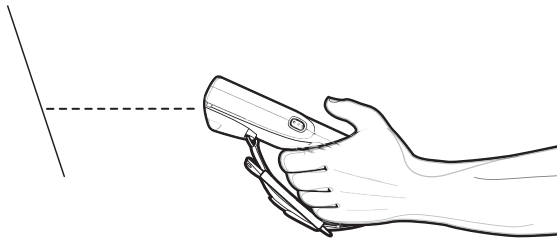


Figure 85 Bar Code Scanning – MC33XX-S

Figure 86 Aiming Pattern: Standard and Extended Range

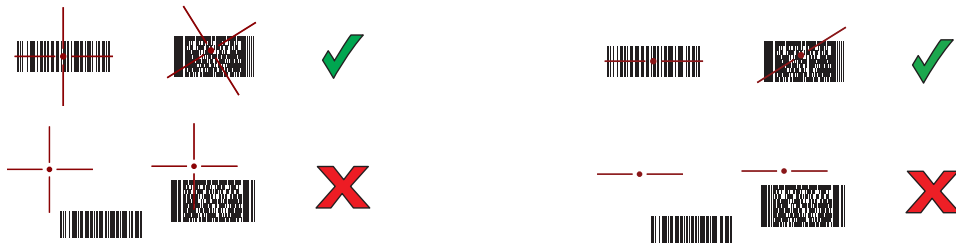


Figure 87 Pick List Mode with Multiple Barcodes in Aiming Pattern: Standard and Extended Range



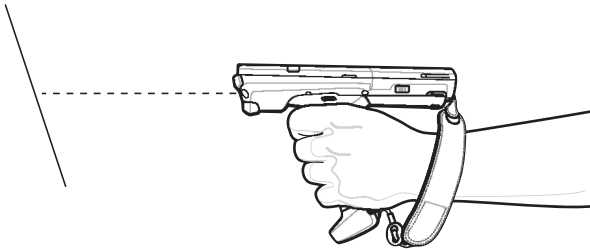

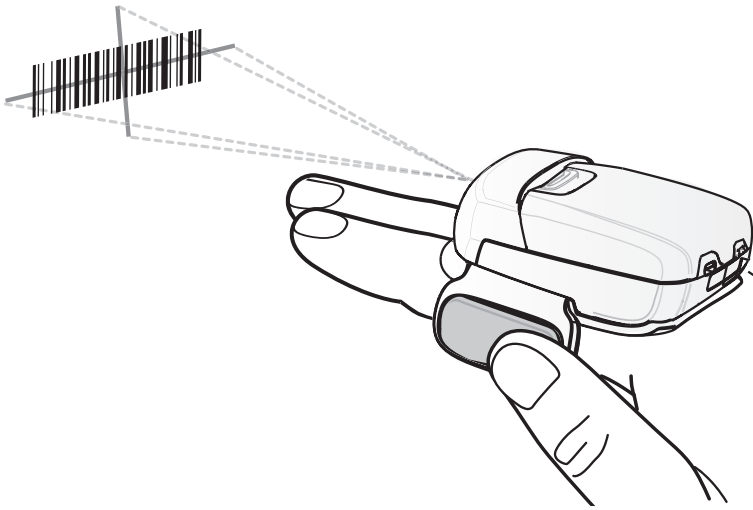

Figure 91 RS507/RS507X Aiming Pattern

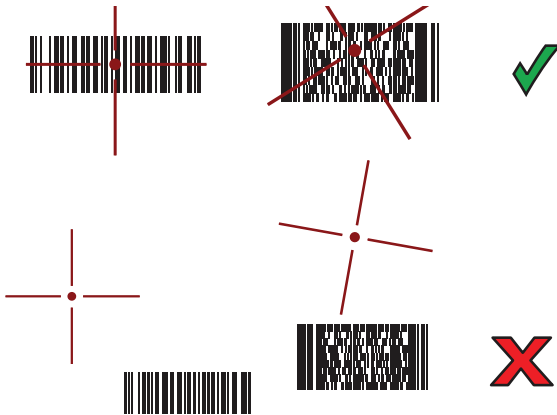


Figure 92 RS507/RS507X Pick List Mode with Multiple Barcodes in Aiming Pattern

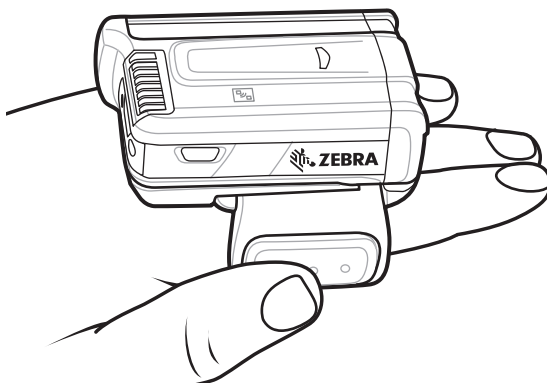

Figure 94 RS6000 Aiming Pattern

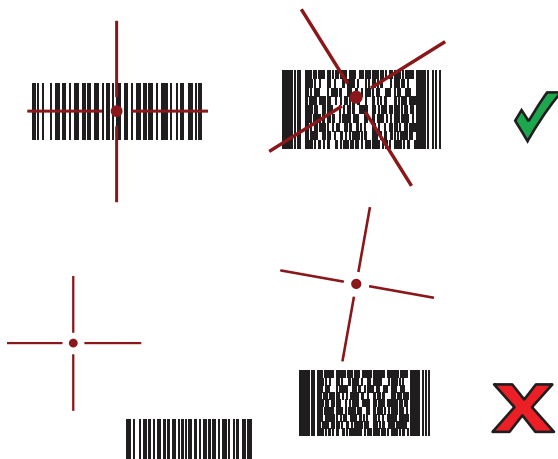


Figure 95 RS6000 Pick List Mode with Multiple Barcodes in Aiming Pattern



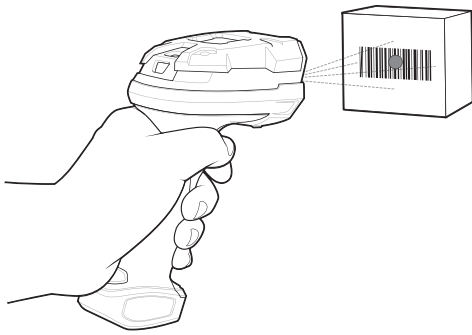

Figure 97 DS3608/DS3678 Aiming Pattern

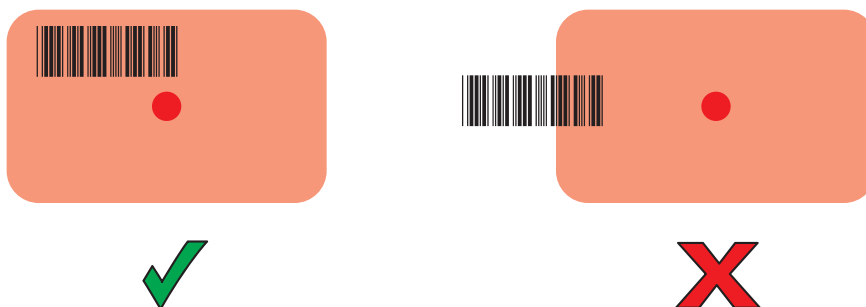
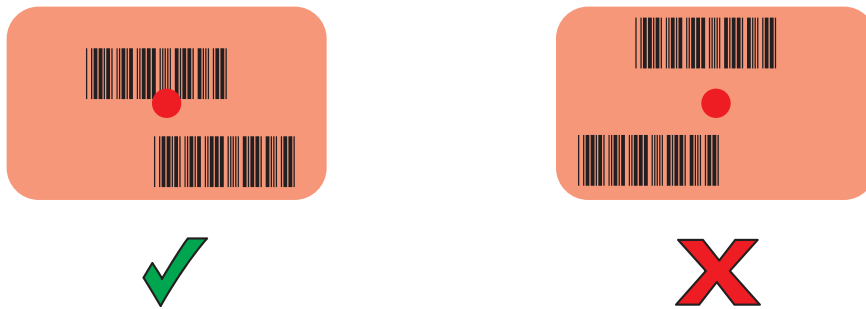


Figure 98 DS3608/DS3678 Pick List Mode with Multiple Barcodes in Aiming Pattern

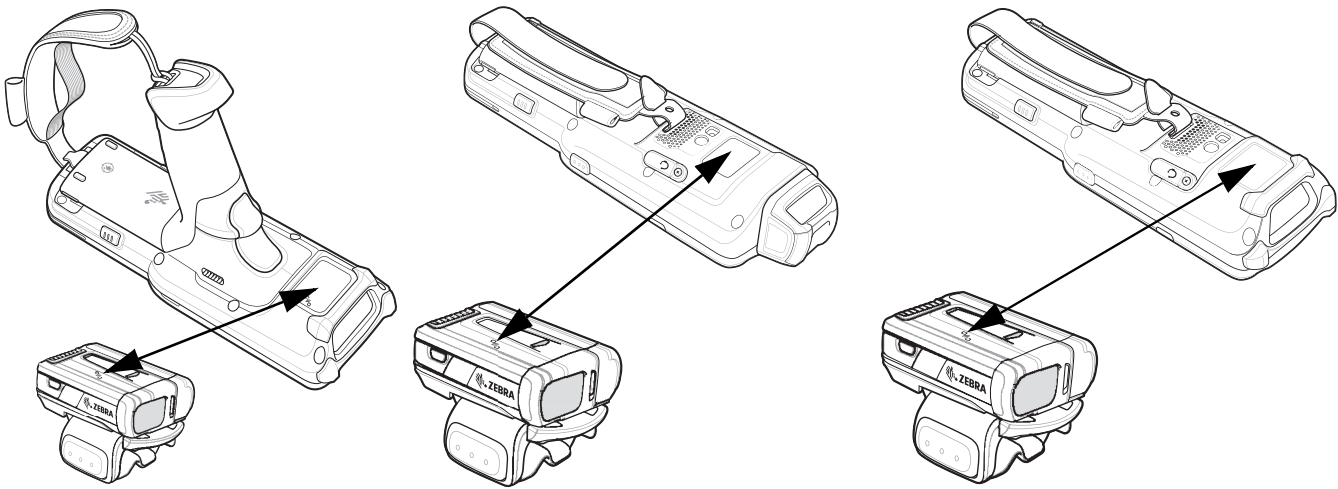

Introduction

Wireless Local Area Networks

Wireless local area networks (WLANs) allow the device to communicate wirelessly inside a building. Before using the device on a WLAN, the facility must be set up with the required hardware to run the WLAN (sometimes known as infrastructure). The infrastructure and the device must both be properly configured to enable this communication.

Refer to the documentation provided with the infrastructure (access points (APs), access ports, switches, Radius servers, etc.) for instructions on how to set up the infrastructure.

Once the infrastructure is set up to enforce the chosen WLAN security scheme, use the **Wireless & networks** settings configure the device to match the security scheme.

The device supports the following WLAN security options:

- Open
- Wireless Equivalent Privacy (WEP)
- Wi-Fi Protected Access (WPA)/WPA2 Personal (PSK)
- Extensible Authentication Protocol (EAP).
 - LEAP
 - Protected Extensible Authentication Protocol (PEAP) - with MSCHAPV2 and GTC authentication
 - Transport Layer Security (TLS)
 - TTLS - with Password Authentication Protocol (PAP), MSCHAP and MSCHAPv2 authentication.
 - EAP-FAST - with MSCHAPV2 and GTC authentication.

The **Status** bar displays icons that indicate Wi-Fi network availability and Wi-Fi status.

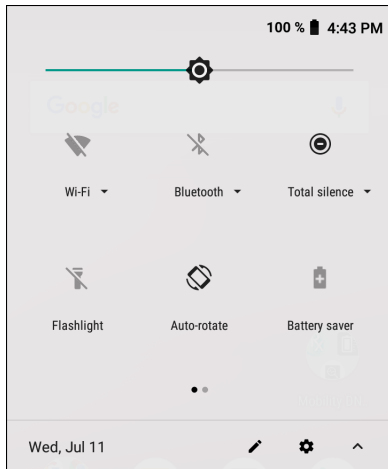

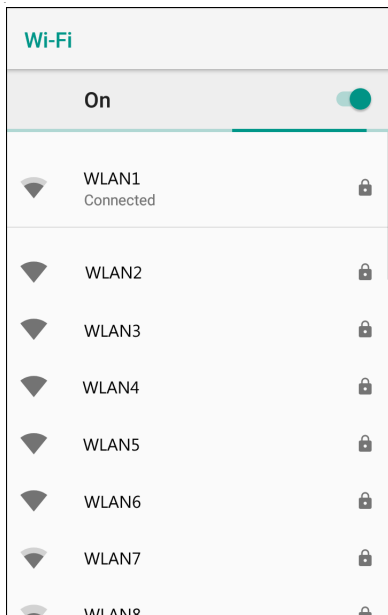
To connect to a Wi-Fi network:

Bluetooth

Bluetooth devices can communicate without wires, using frequency-hopping spread spectrum (FHSS) radio frequency (RF) to transmit and receive data in the 2.4 GHz Industry Scientific and Medical (ISM) band (802.15.1). Bluetooth wireless technology is specifically designed for short-range (10 m (32.8 ft)) communication and low power consumption.

Devices with Bluetooth capabilities can exchange information (for example, files, appointments, and tasks) with other Bluetooth enabled devices such as printers, access points, and other mobile devices.

The device supports Bluetooth Low Energy. Bluetooth Low Energy is targeted at applications in the healthcare, fitness, security, and home entertainment industries. It provides reduced power consumption and cost while maintaining standard Bluetooth range.

Adaptive Frequency Hopping

Adaptive Frequency Hopping (AFH) is a method of avoiding fixed frequency interferers, and can be used with Bluetooth voice. All devices in the piconet (Bluetooth network) must be AFH-capable in order for AFH to work. There is no AFH when connecting and discovering devices. Avoid making Bluetooth connections and discoveries during critical 802.11b communications. AFH for Bluetooth consists of four main sections:

- Channel Classification - A method of detecting an interference on a channel-by-channel basis, or pre-defined channel mask.
- Link Management - Coordinates and distributes the AFH information to the rest of the Bluetooth network.
- Hop Sequence Modification - Avoids interference by selectively reducing the number of hopping channels.
- Channel Maintenance - A method for periodically re-evaluating the channels.

When AFH is enabled, the Bluetooth radio “hops around” (instead of through) the 802.11b high-rate channels. AFH coexistence allows enterprise devices to operate in any infrastructure.

The Bluetooth radio in this device operates as a Class 2 device power class. The maximum output power is 2.5 mW and the expected range is 10 m (32.8 ft). A definition of ranges based on power class is difficult to obtain due to power and device differences, and whether in open space or closed office space.



NOTE: It is not recommended to perform Bluetooth wireless technology inquiry when high rate 802.11b operation is required.

Security

The current Bluetooth specification defines security at the link level. Application-level security is not specified. This allows application developers to define security mechanisms tailored to their specific need. Link-level security occurs between devices, not users, while application-level security can be implemented on a per-user basis. The Bluetooth specification defines security algorithms and procedures required to authenticate devices, and if needed, encrypt the data flowing on the link between the devices. Device authentication is a mandatory feature of Bluetooth while link encryption is optional.

Pairing of Bluetooth devices is accomplished by creating an initialization key used to authenticate the devices and create a link key for them. Entering a common personal identification number (PIN) in the devices being paired generates the initialization key. The PIN is never sent over the air. By default, the Bluetooth stack responds with no key when a key is requested (it is up to user to respond to the key request event). Authentication of Bluetooth devices is based-upon a challenge-response transaction. Bluetooth allows for a PIN or passkey used to create other 128-bit keys used for security and encryption. The encryption key is derived from the link key used to authenticate the pairing devices. Also worthy of note is the limited range and fast frequency hopping of the Bluetooth radios that makes long-distance eavesdropping difficult.

Recommendations are:

- Perform pairing in a secure environment
- Keep PIN codes private and do not store the PIN codes in the device
- Implement application-level security.

Bluetooth Power States

The Bluetooth radio is off by default:

- Suspend - When the device goes into suspend mode, the Bluetooth radio stays on.
- Airplane Mode - When the device is placed in Airplane Mode, the Bluetooth radio turns off. When Airplane mode is disabled, the Bluetooth radio returns to the prior state. When in Airplane Mode, the Bluetooth radio can be turned back on if desired.

Bluetooth Radio Power



Turn off the Bluetooth radio to save power or if entering an area with radio restrictions (for example, an airplane). When the radio is off, other Bluetooth devices cannot see or connect to the device. Turn on the Bluetooth radio to exchange information with other Bluetooth devices (within range). Communicate only with Bluetooth radios in close proximity.



NOTE: To achieve the best battery life, turn off radios when not in use.


Enabling Bluetooth


To enable Bluetooth:

1. Swipe down from the Status bar to open the Quick Access panel.

Disabling Bluetooth

3. Ensure that the two devices are within 10 meters (32.8 feet) of one another.
4. Swipe down from the Status bar to open the Quick Access panel.
5. Touch **Bluetooth**.
6. Touch **MORE SETTINGS**. The **Bluetooth** screen appears.
7. Touch **Pair new device**. The device begins searching for discoverable Bluetooth devices in the area and displays them under **Available devices**.
8. Scroll through the list and select a device. The Bluetooth pairing request dialog box appears.
9. Touch **Pair** on both devices.
10. The Bluetooth device is added to the **Paired devices** list and a trusted ("paired") connection is established.


Changing the Bluetooth Name

By default, the device has a generic Bluetooth name that is visible to other devices when connected.

NFC/HF RFID is a short-range wireless connectivity technology standard that enables secure transaction between a reader and a contactless smartcard. 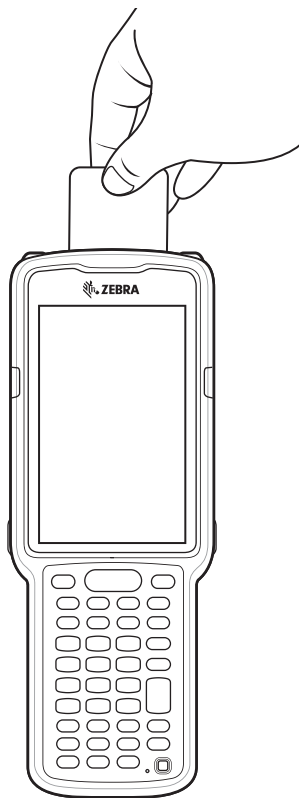

Figure 107 Reading Cards



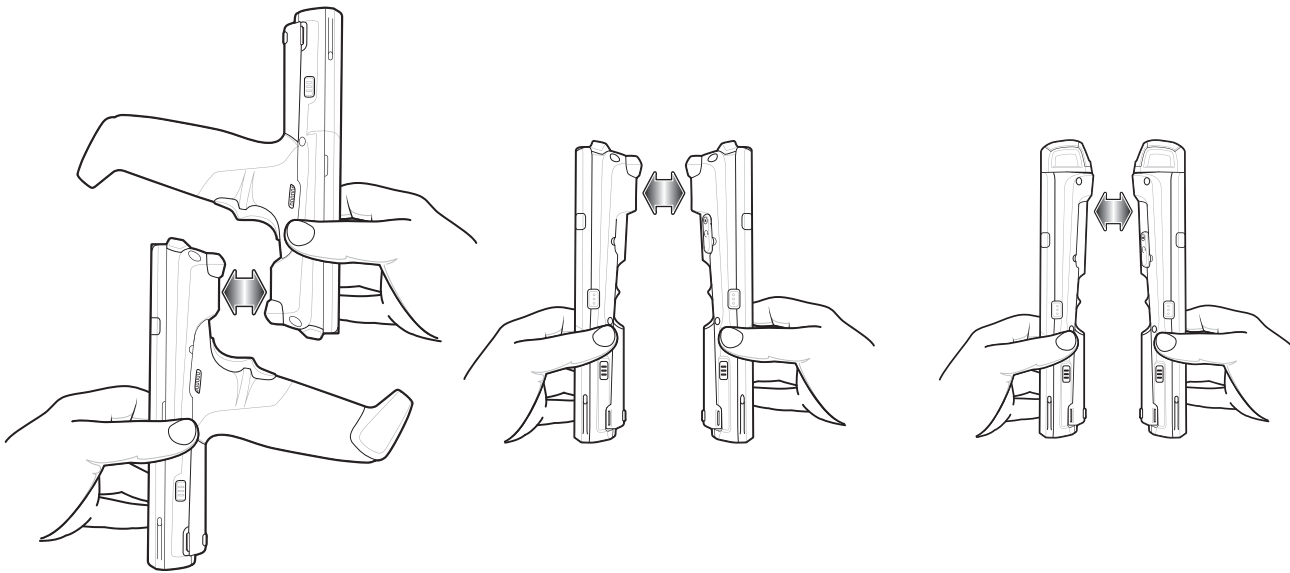

Figure 108 Sharing Data Using NFC




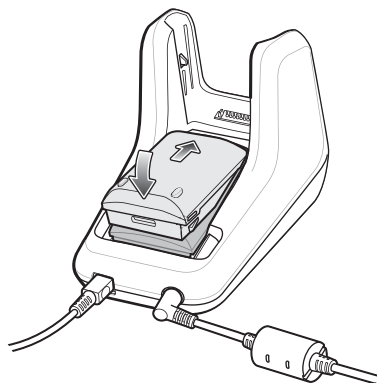

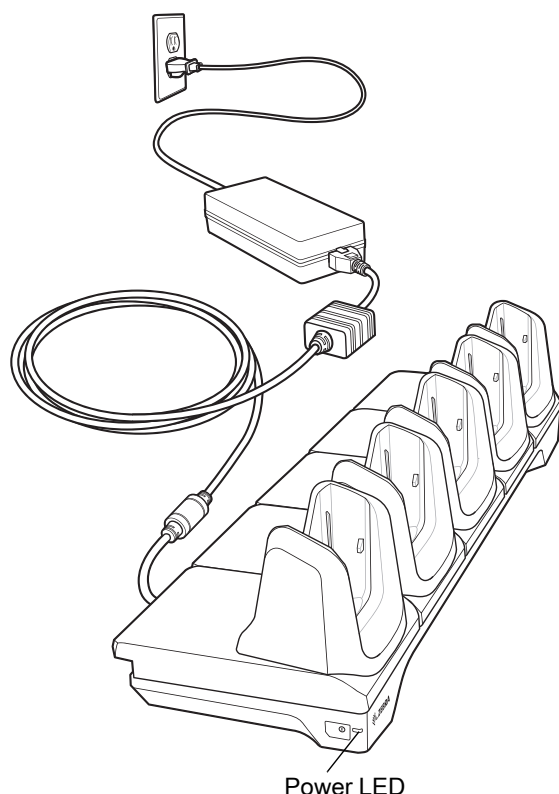

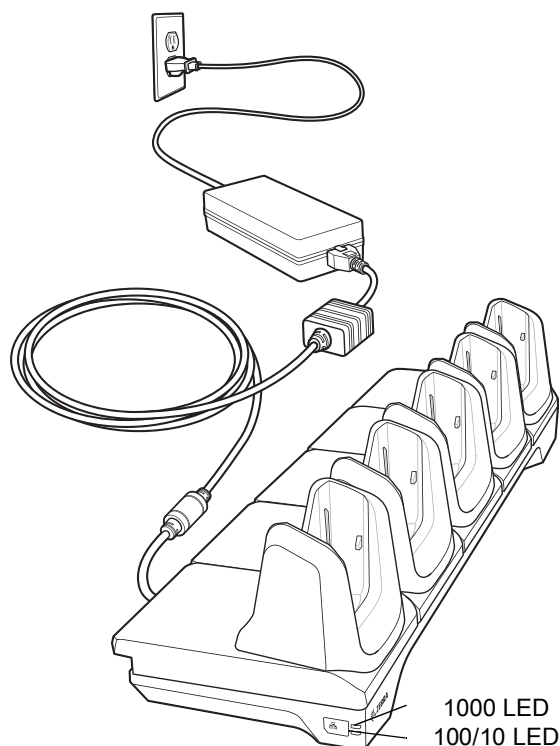

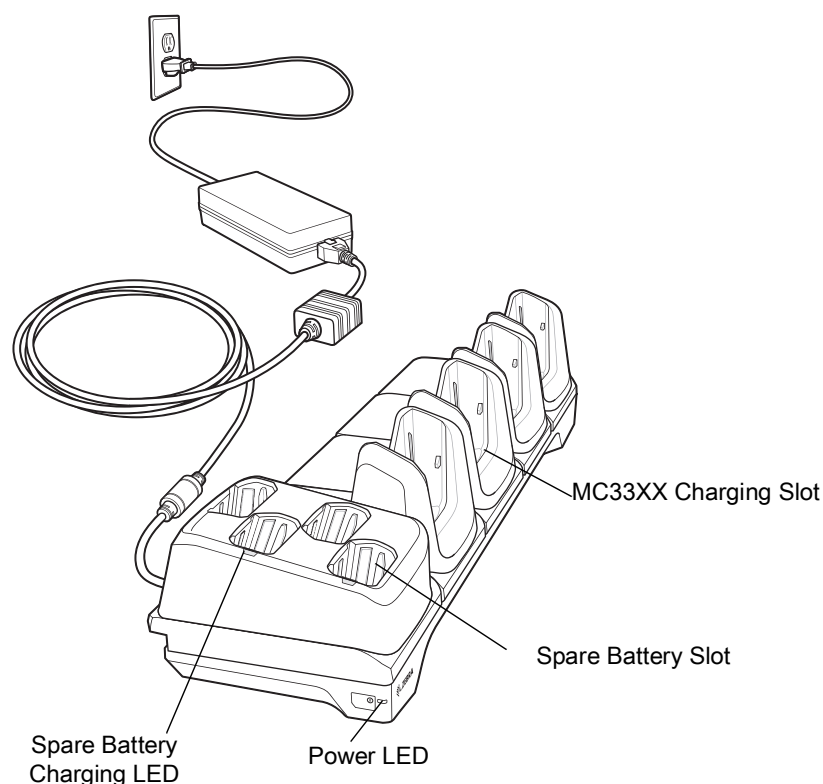

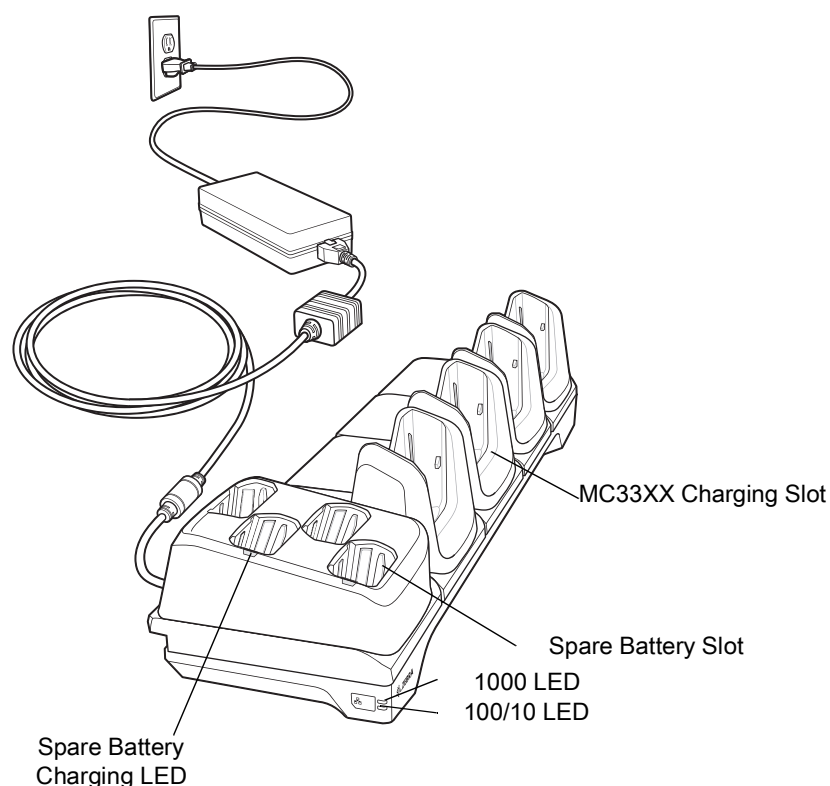

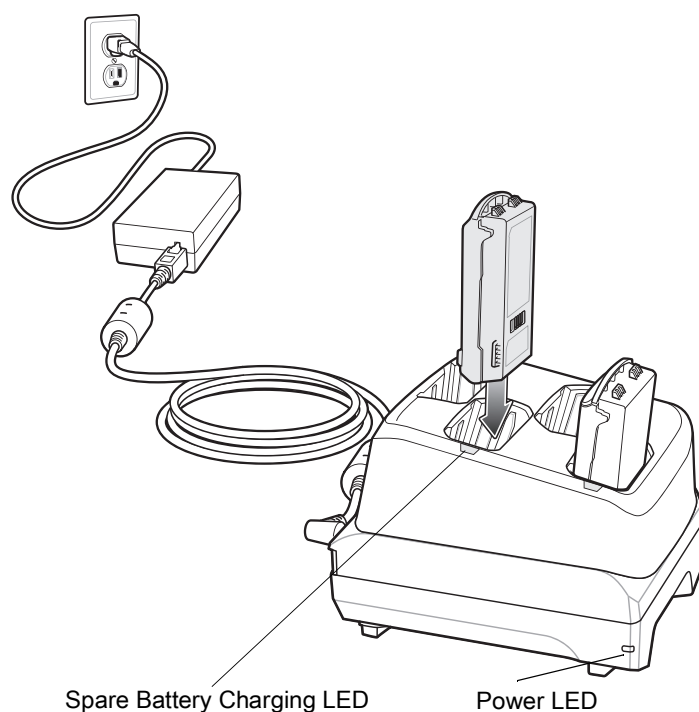

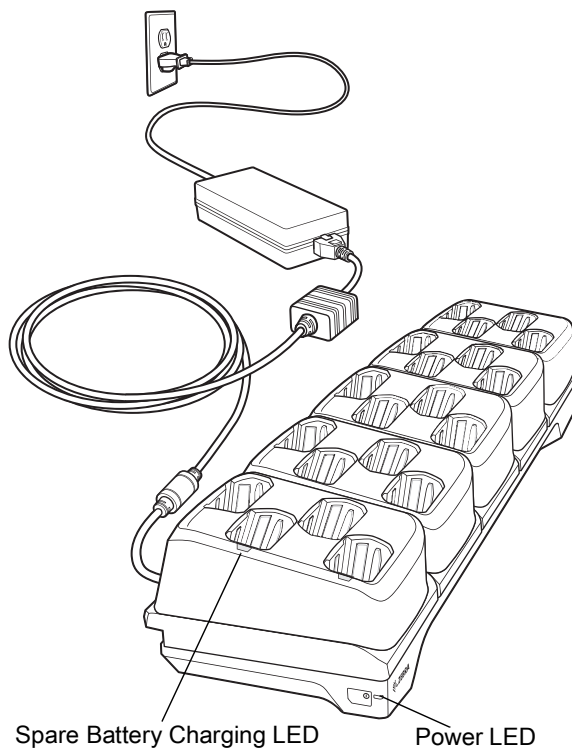

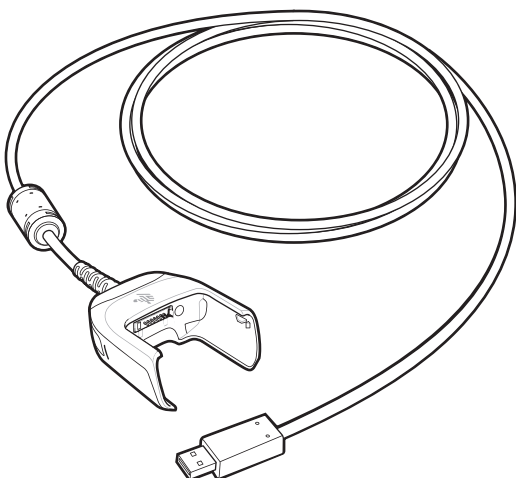

Figure 117 USB Charge Cable



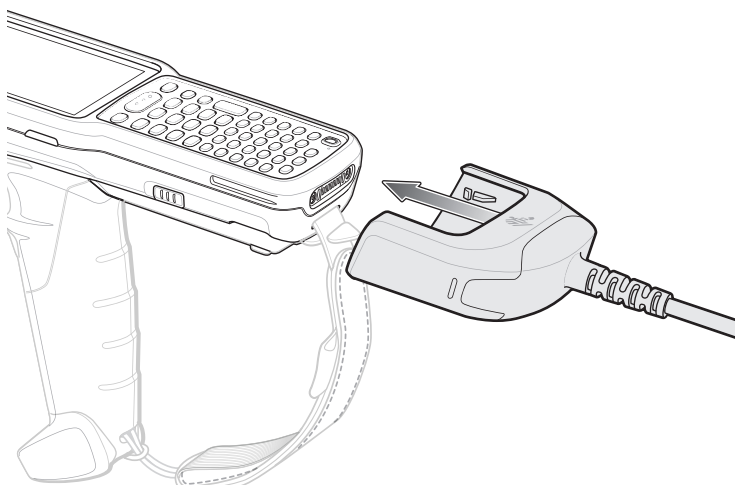

Figure 118 Connecting the USB Charge Cable

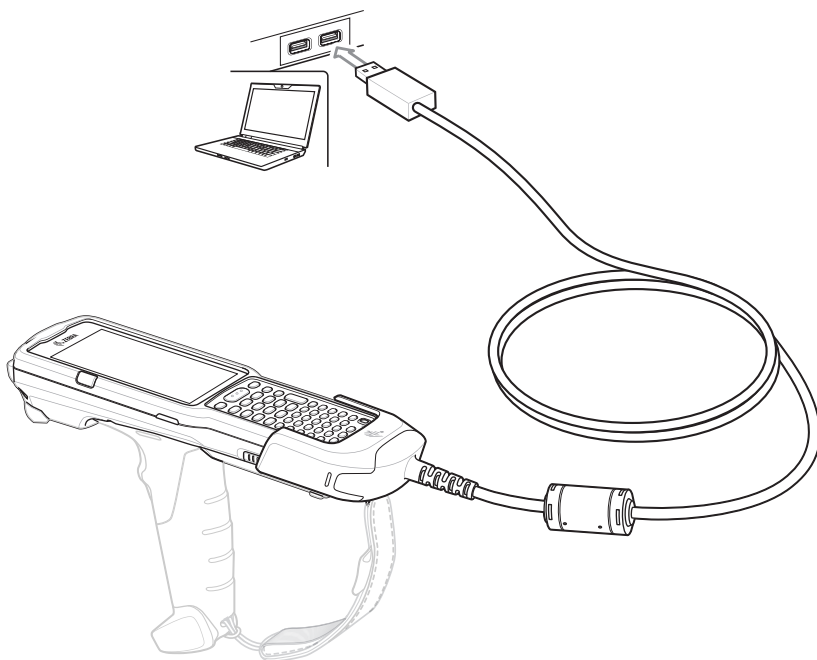

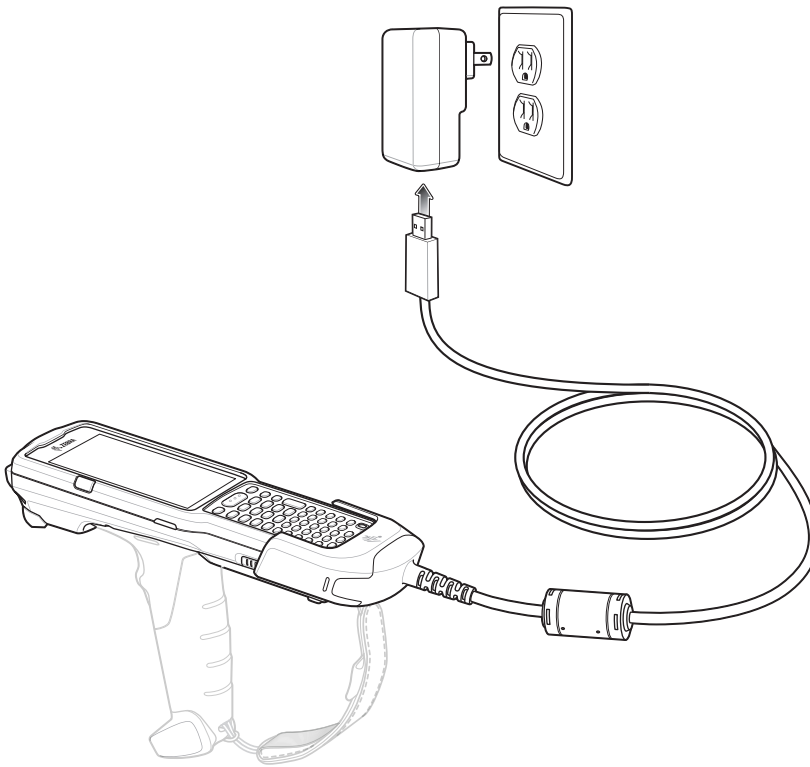

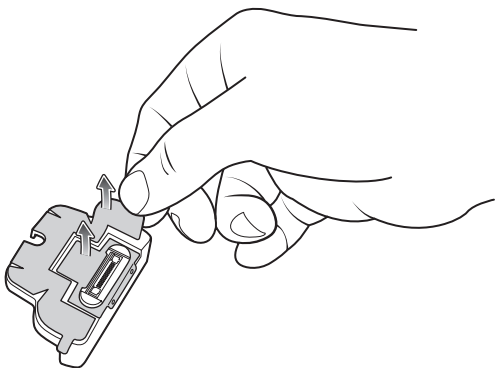

Figure 122 Clean MC32N0 Cradle



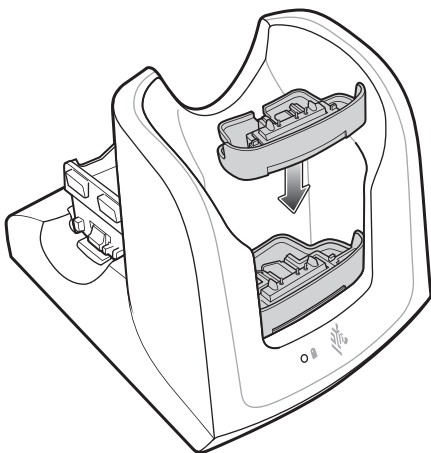

Figure 123 Peel and Remove Adhesive



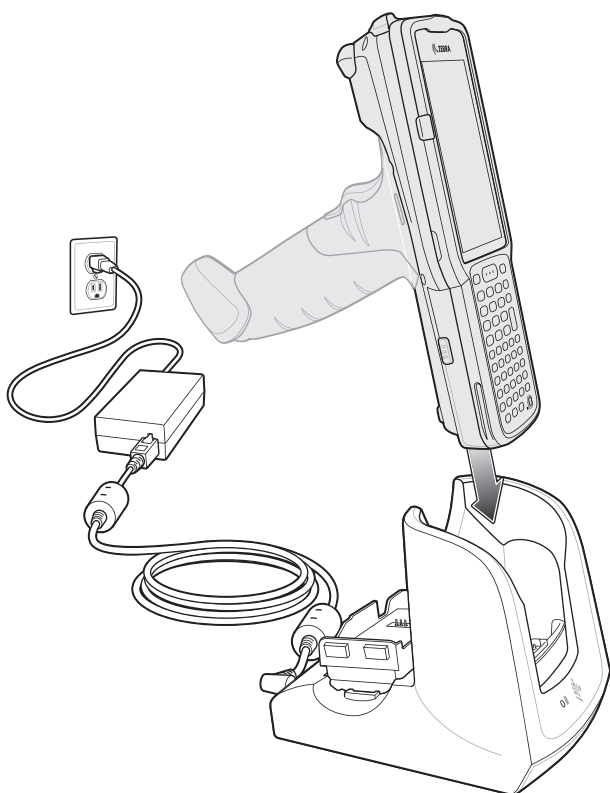

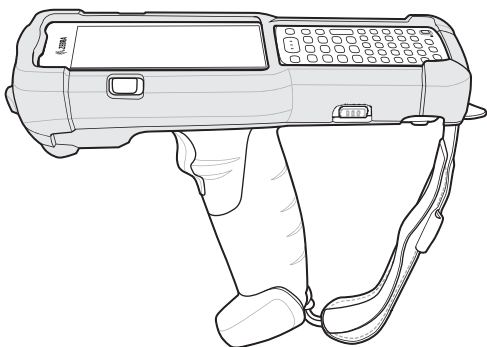

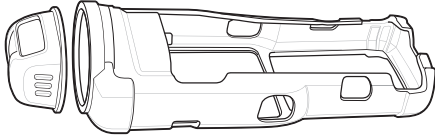

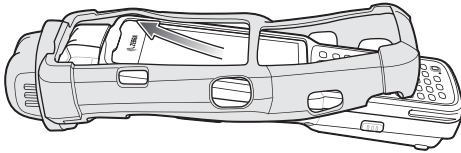

Figure 128 Two Piece Rubber Boot



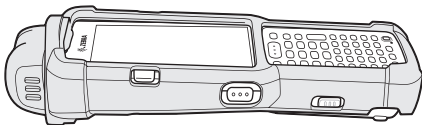

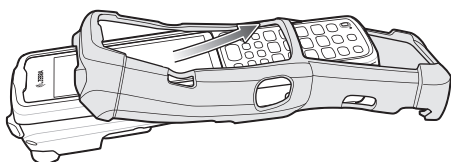

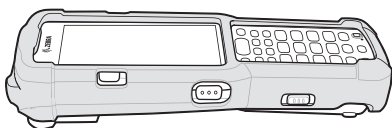

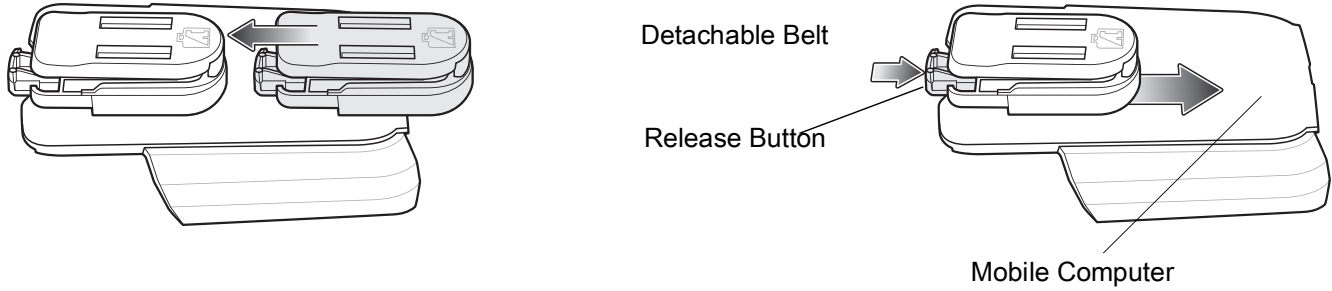
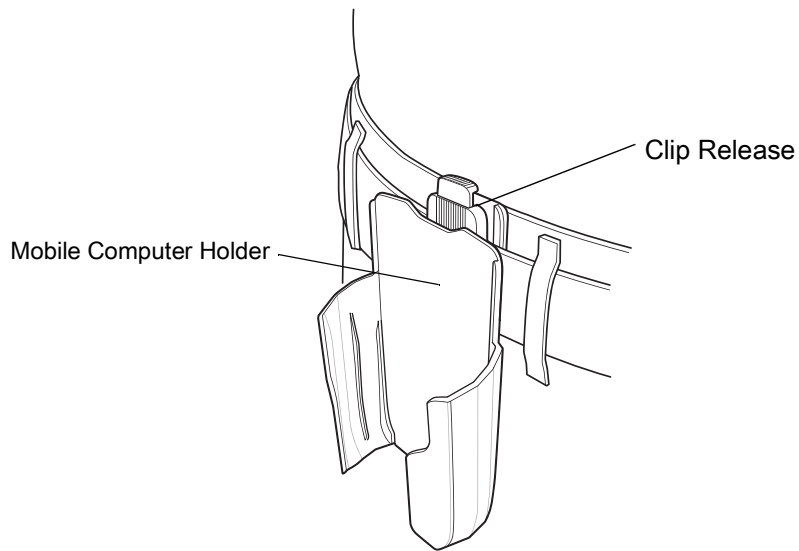


Figure 134 Attaching the Rigid Holster

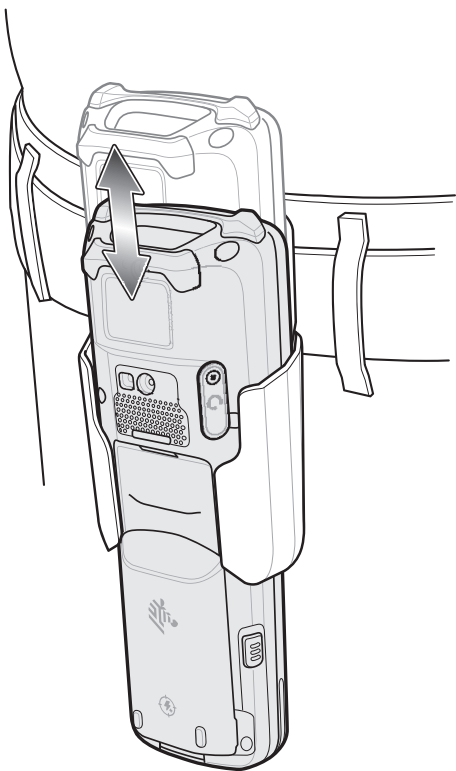

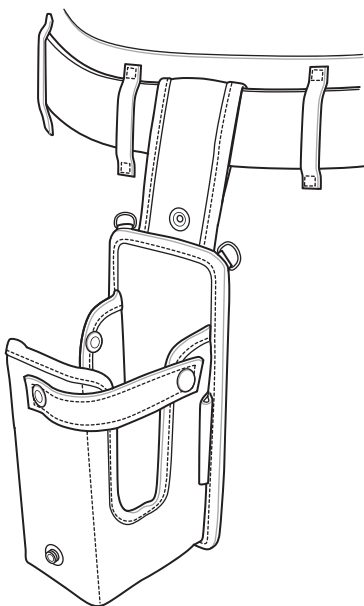

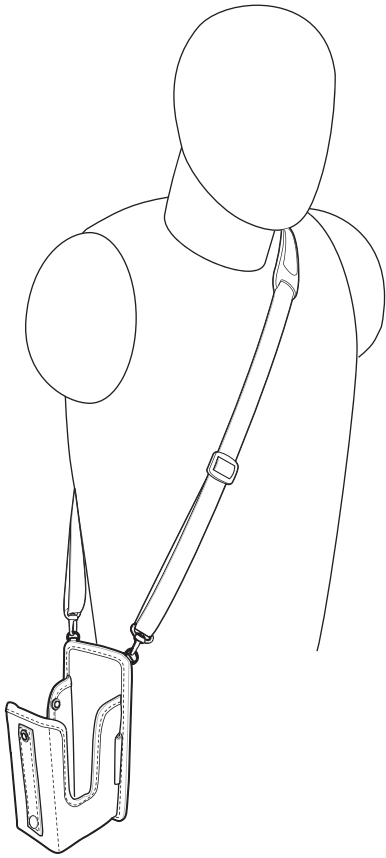
Figure 136 Attach the Fabric Holster to a Belt

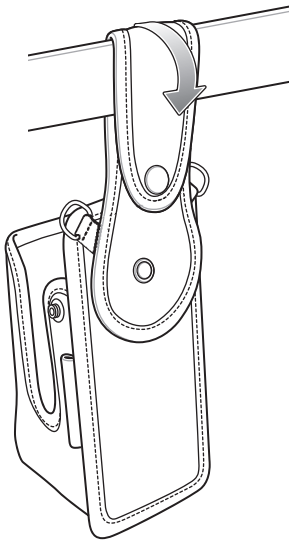

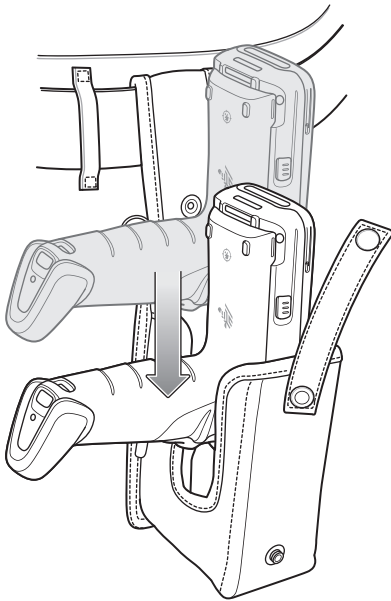

Figure 138 Secure Belt Strap On Belt



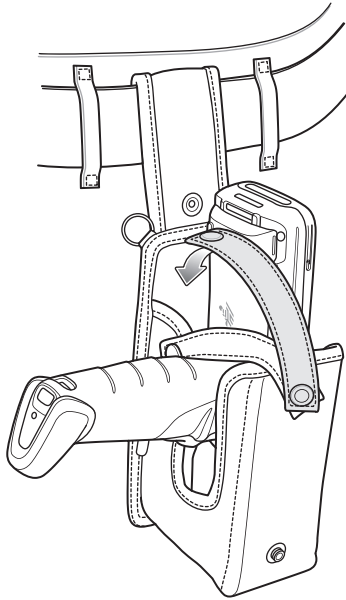

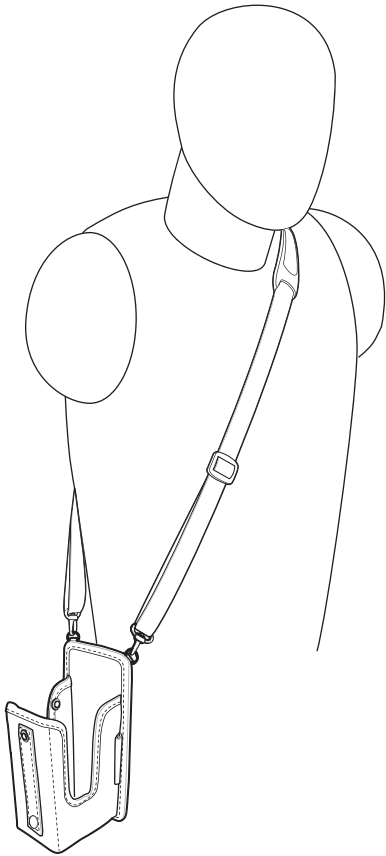

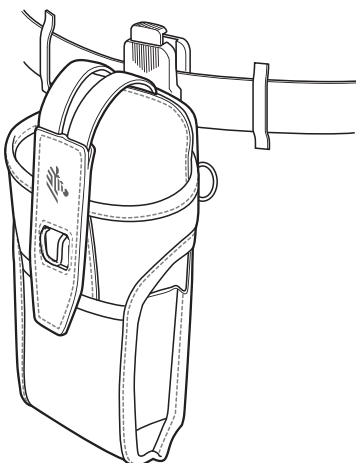

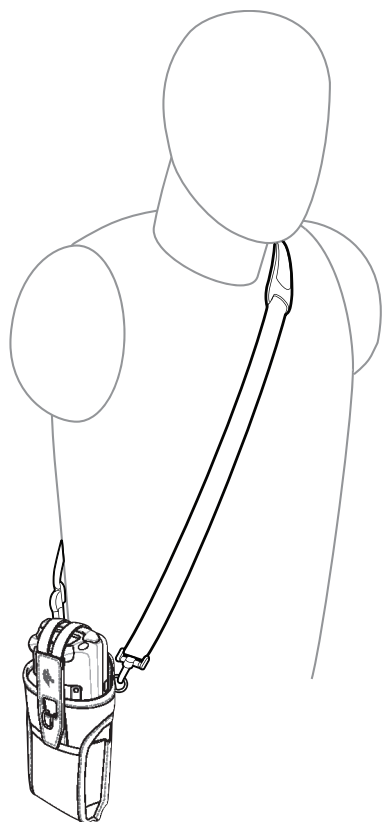
Figure 142 Attach the Fabric Holster to a Belt

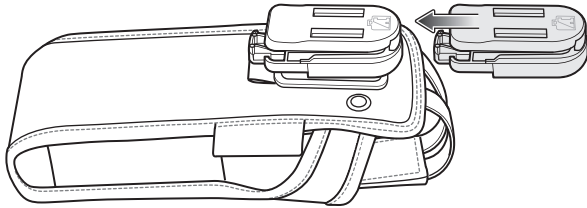

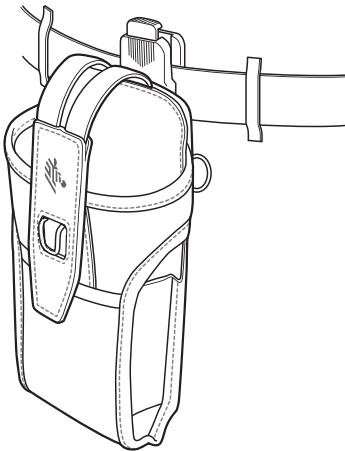

Figure 144 Secure Belt Clip On Fabric Holster



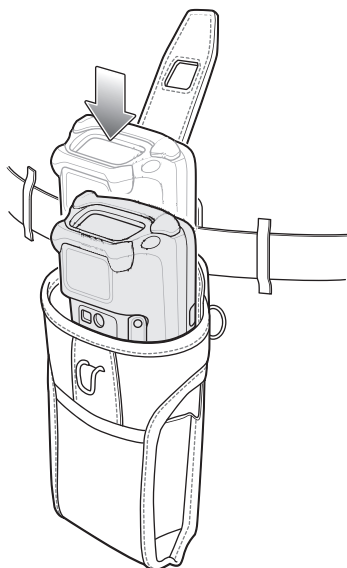

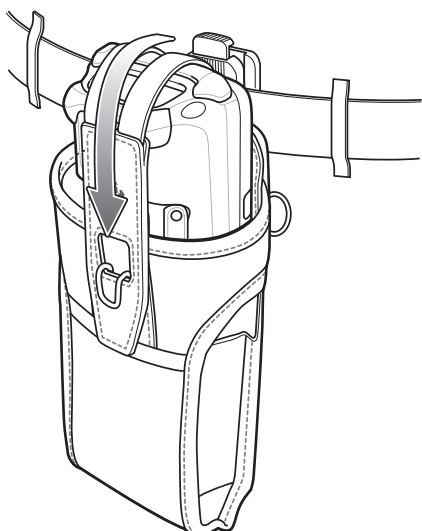

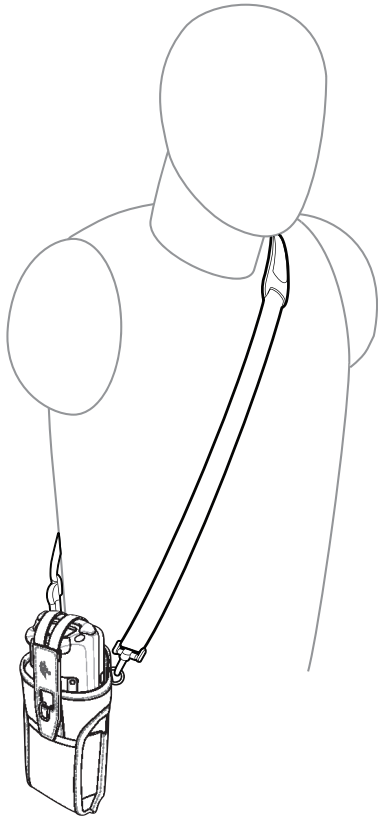

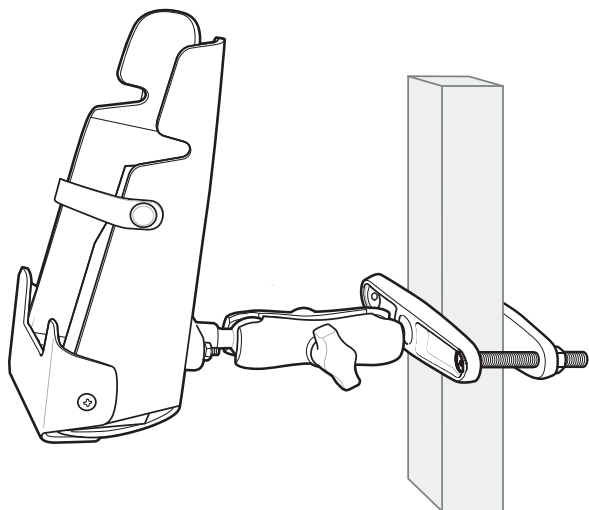

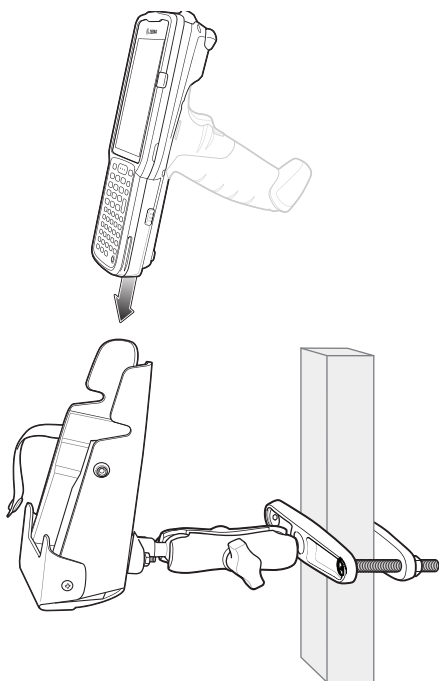
Figure 149 Forklift Mount

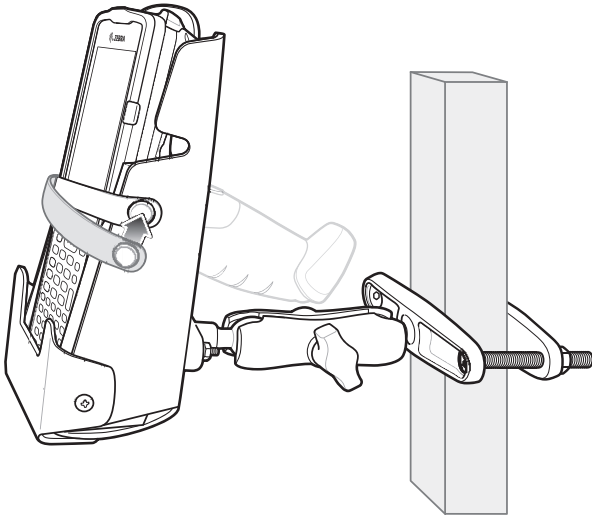

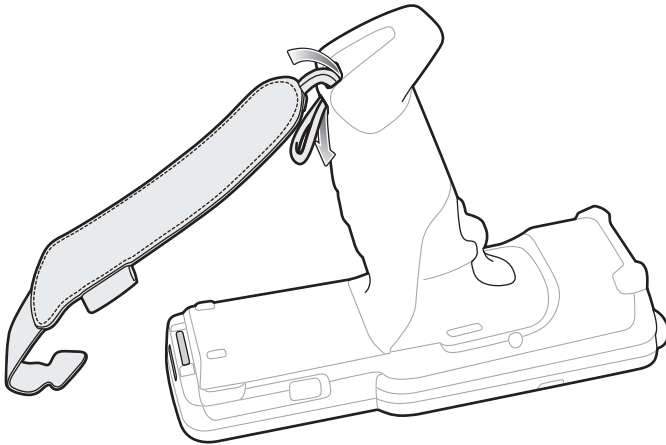

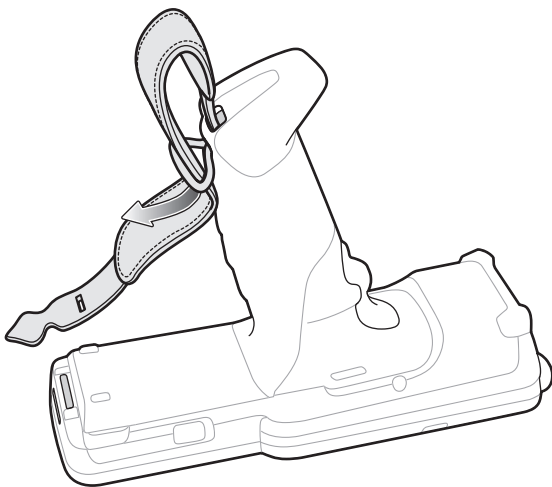

Figure 152 Insert Loop Through Handle Slot



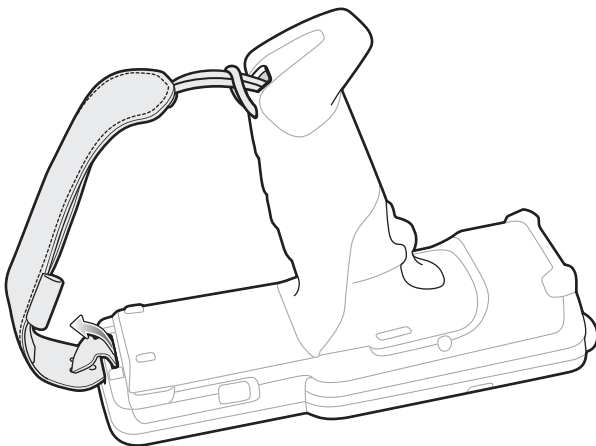

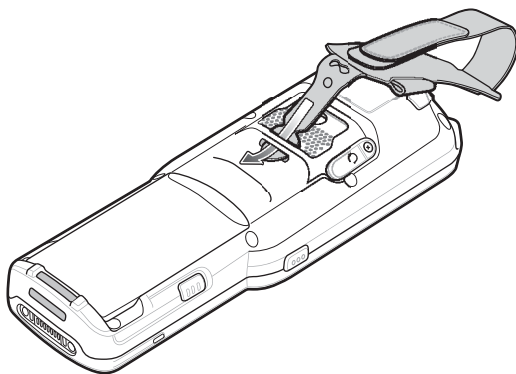

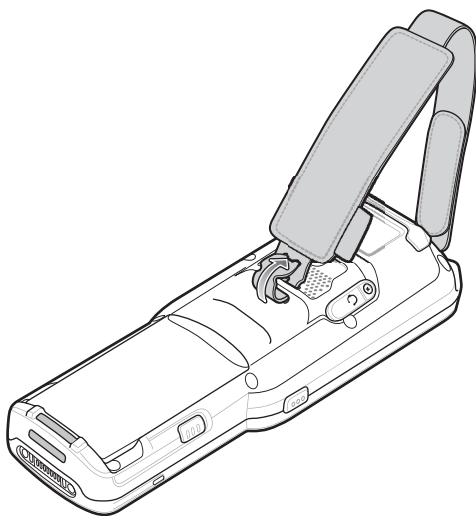

Figure 155 Thread Tab Through Top Slot



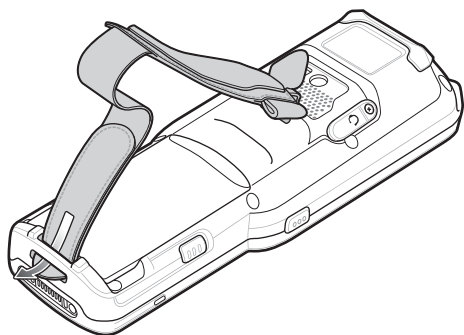

Figure 156 Slide Tab Through Slit



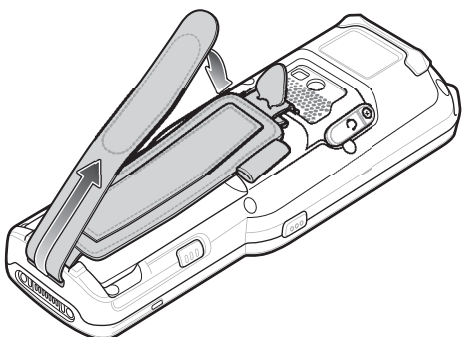

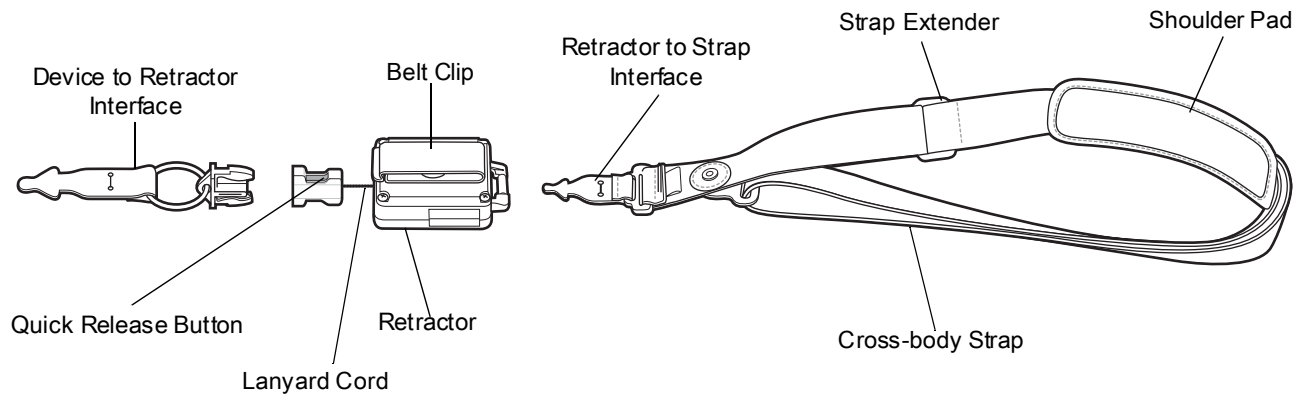

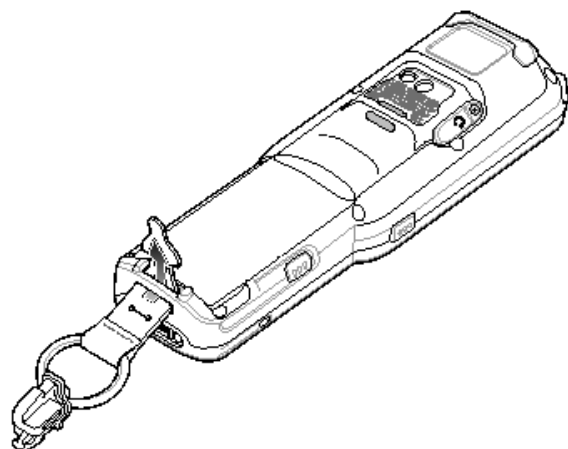

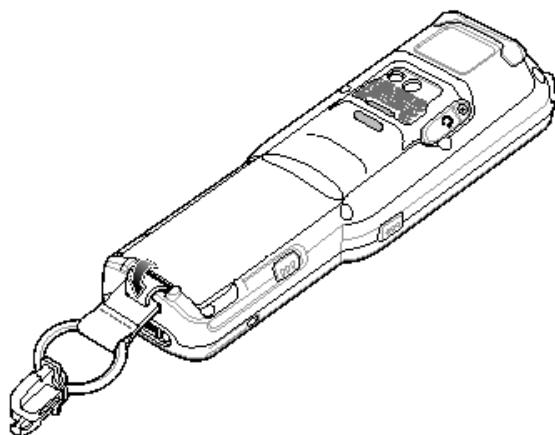

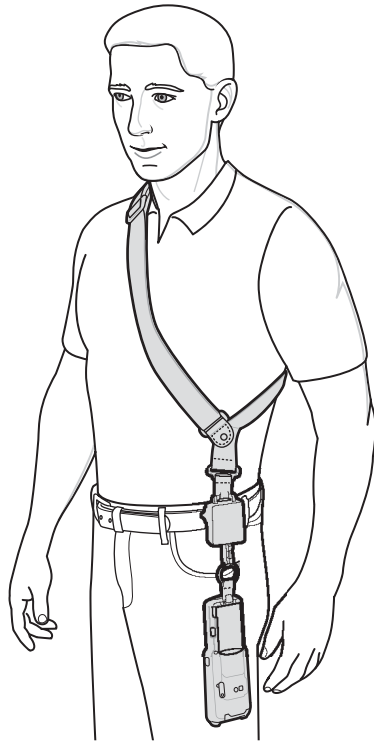
Figure 161 Slide Tab Through Slit

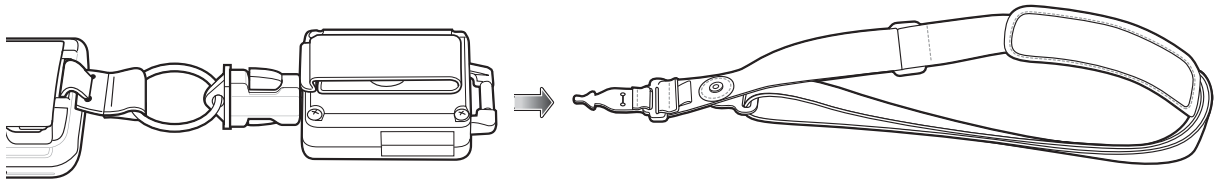

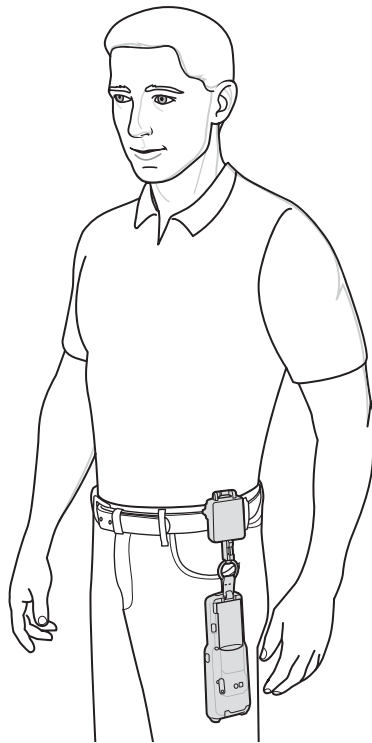

Maintenance and Troubleshooting

Introduction

This chapter includes instructions on cleaning and storing the device, and provides troubleshooting solutions for potential problems during operation.

Maintaining the Device

For trouble-free service, observe the following tips when using the device:

- In order to avoid scratching the screen, use the supplied stylus or plastic-tipped pens intended for use with a touch-sensitive screen. Never use an actual pen or pencil or other sharp object on the surface of the device screen.
- The touch-sensitive screen of the device is glass. Do not drop the device or subject it to strong impact.
- Protect the device from temperature extremes. Do not leave it on the dashboard of a car on a hot day, and keep it away from heat sources.
- Do not store the device in any location that is dusty, damp, or wet.
- Use a soft lens cloth to clean the device. If the surface of the device screen becomes soiled, clean it with a soft cloth moistened with an approved cleanser. For a list of approved cleansers, see Approved Cleanser Active Ingredients.
- Periodically replace the rechargeable battery to ensure maximum battery life and product performance. Battery life depends on individual usage patterns.
- A screen protector is applied to the device. Zebra recommends using this to minimize wear and tear. Screen protectors enhance the usability and durability of touch screen displays. Benefits include:
 - Protection from scratches and gouges
 - Durable writing and touch surface with tactile feel
 - Abrasion and chemical resistance
 - Glare reduction
 - Keeping the device's screen looking new
 - Quick and easy installation.

Battery Safety Guidelines

- The area in which the units are charged should be clear of debris and combustible materials or chemicals. Particular care should be taken where the device is charged in a non commercial environment.
- Follow battery usage, storage, and charging guidelines found in this guide.
- Improper battery use may result in a fire, explosion, or other hazard.
- To charge the mobile device battery, the battery and charger temperatures must be between +32°F and +104°F (0°C and +40°C)
- Do not use incompatible batteries and chargers, including non-Zebra batteries and chargers. Use of an incompatible battery or charger may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage, or other hazard. If you have any questions about the compatibility of a battery or a charger, contact the Global Customer Support Center.
- For devices that utilize a USB port as a charging source, the device shall only be connected to products that bear the USB-IF logo or have completed the USB-IF compliance program.
- To enable authentication of an approved battery, as required by IEEE1725 clause 10.2.1, all batteries will carry a hologram. Do not fit any battery without checking it has the authentication hologram.
- Do not disassemble or open, crush, bend or deform, puncture, or shred battery.
- Severe impact from dropping any battery-operated device on a hard surface could cause the battery to overheat.
- Do not short circuit a battery or allow metallic or conductive objects to contact the battery terminals.
- Do not modify or remanufacture, attempt to insert foreign objects into the battery, immerse or expose to water or other liquids, or expose to fire, explosion, or other hazard.
- Do not leave or store the equipment in or near areas that might get very hot, such as in a parked vehicle or near a radiator or other heat source. Do not place battery into a microwave oven or dryer.
- Battery usage by children should be supervised.
- Please follow local regulations to properly dispose of used re-chargeable batteries.

Approved Cleanser Active Ingredients

100% of the active ingredients in any cleaner must consist of one or some combination of the following: isopropyl alcohol, bleach/sodium hypochlorite¹ (see important note below), hydrogen peroxide, ammonium chloride or mild dish soap.



- Use pre-moistened wipes and do not allow liquid cleaner to pool.

¹When using sodium hypochlorite (bleach) based products always follow the manufacturer's recommended instructions: use gloves during application and remove the residue afterwards with a damp alcohol cloth or a cotton swab to avoid prolonged skin contact while handling the device.

Due to the powerful oxidizing nature of sodium hypochlorite the metal surfaces on the device are prone to oxidation (corrosion) when exposed to this chemical in the liquid form (including wipes). In the event that these type of disinfectants come in contact with metal on the device, prompt removal with an alcohol-dampened cloth or cotton swab after the cleaning step is critical.

Harmful Ingredients

The following chemicals are known to damage the plastics on the device and should not come in contact with the device: acetone; ketones; ethers; aromatic and chlorinated hydrocarbons; aqueous or alcoholic alkaline solutions; ethanolamine; toluene; trichloroethylene; benzene; carbolic acid and TB-lysoform.

Many vinyl gloves contain phthalate additives, which are often not recommended for medical use and are known to be harmful to the housing of the device.

Cleaning Materials Required

- Alcohol wipes
- Lens tissue
- Cotton-tipped applicators
- Isopropyl alcohol
- Can of compressed air with a tube.

Device Cleaning Instructions

Do not apply liquid directly to the device. Dampen a soft cloth or use pre-moistened wipes. Do not wrap the device in the cloth or wipe, but gently wipe the unit. Be careful not to let liquid pool around the display window or other places. Allow the unit to air dry before use.



NOTE: For thorough cleaning, it is recommended to first remove all accessory attachments, such as hand straps or cradle cups, from the mobile device and to clean them separately.

Special Cleaning Notes

The device should not be handled while wearing vinyl gloves containing phthalates, or before hands are washed to remove contaminant residue after gloves are removed.

If products containing any of the harmful ingredients listed above are used prior to handling the device, such as hand sanitizer that contain ethanolamine, hands must be completely dry before handling the device to prevent damage to the device.



IMPORTANT: If the battery connectors are exposed to cleaning agents, thoroughly wipe off as much of the chemical as possible and clean with an alcohol wipe. It is also recommended to install the battery in the terminal prior to cleaning and disinfecting the device to help minimize buildup on the connectors.

When using cleaning/disinfectant agents on the device, it is important to follow the directions prescribed by the

cleaning/disinfectant agent manufacturer.

Cleaning Frequency

The cleaning frequency is at the customer's discretion due to the varied environments in which the mobile devices are used and may be cleaned as frequently as required. When dirt is visible, it is recommended to clean the mobile device to avoid build up of particles which make the device more difficult to clean later on.

For consistency and optimum image capture, it is recommended to clean the camera window periodically especially when used in environments prone to dirt or dust.

Cleaning the Device

Housing

Thoroughly wipe the housing, including all buttons and triggers, using an approved alcohol wipe.

Display

The display can be wiped down with an approved alcohol wipe, but care should be taken not to allow any pooling of liquid around the edges of the display. Immediately dry the display with a soft, non-abrasive cloth to prevent streaking.

Camera and Exit Window

Wipe the camera and exit window periodically with a lens tissue or other material suitable for cleaning optical material such as eyeglasses.

Cleaning Battery Connectors

To clean the battery connectors:

1. Remove the main battery from the mobile computer.
2. Dip the cotton portion of the cotton-tipped applicator in isopropyl alcohol.
3. To remove any grease or dirt, rub the cotton portion of the cotton-tipped applicator back-and-forth across the connectors on the battery and terminal sides. Do not leave any cotton residue on the connectors.
4. Repeat at least three times.
5. Use a dry cotton-tipped applicator and repeat steps 3 and 4. Do not leave any cotton residue on the connectors.
6. Inspect the area for any grease or dirt and repeat the cleaning process if necessary.



CAUTION: After cleaning the battery connectors with bleach-based chemicals, follow the Battery Connector Cleaning instructions to remove bleach from the connectors.

Cleaning Cradle Connectors

To clean the connectors on a cradle:

1. Remove the DC power cable from the cradle.

2. Dip the cotton portion of the cotton-tipped applicator in isopropyl alcohol.
 3. Rub the cotton portion of the cotton-tipped applicator along the pins of the connector. Slowly move the applicator back-and-forth from one side of the connector to the other. Do not leave any cotton residue on the connector.
 4. All sides of the connector should also be rubbed with the cotton-tipped applicator.
 5. Remove any lint left by the cotton-tipped applicator.
 6. If grease and other dirt can be found on other areas of the cradle, use a lint-free cloth and alcohol to remove.
 7. Allow at least 10 to 30 minutes (depending on ambient temperature and humidity) for the alcohol to air dry before applying power to cradle.
- If the temperature is low and humidity is high, longer drying time is required. Warm temperature and low humidity requires less drying time.



CAUTION: After cleaning the cradle connectors with bleach-based chemicals, follow the Cleaning Cradle Connectors instructions to remove bleach from the connectors.

Keypads

Introduction

The MC33XX offers three types of keypad configurations: 29 key, 38 key and 47 key.

MC33XX 29-Key Keypad

The 29-key keypad contains a Power button, application keys, scroll keys and function keys. The keypad is color-coded to indicate the alternate function key (blue) values and the alternate ALPHA key (orange) values. Note that keypad functions can be changed by an application so the mobile computer keypad may not function as described. See the tables below for key and button descriptions and keypad alternate functions.

Figure 165 29-Key Keypad Configuration

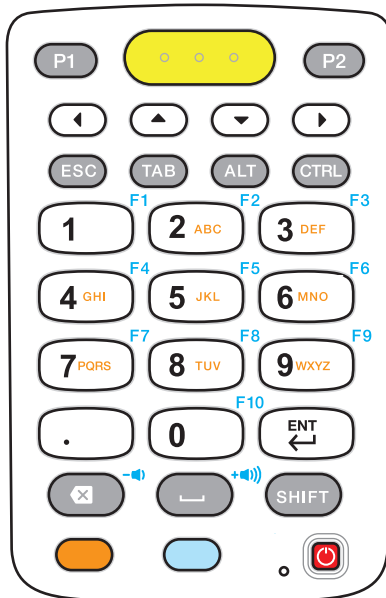

Figure 166 38-Key Keypad Configuration

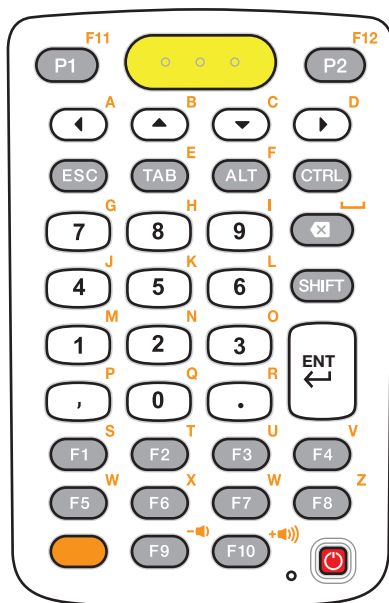










Figure 167 47-Key Keypad Configuration

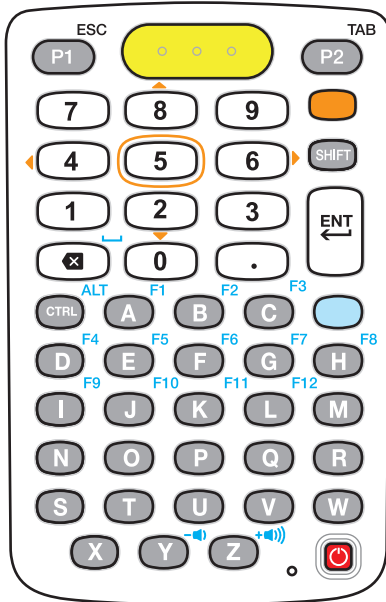
